Cattle Going Overland From Utah to Omaha.

## COUNTERFEITERS IN THE WEST.

Damage Suits Because of Cowpox Troubles—Tuberculosis in Cattle—Fatalities.

Laramie, Wyo., *Boomerang*: It is generally stated that a herd of 2,000 cattle is being moved in southern Utah and is well on its way now to go overland to Omaha.

Charles Smith is in jail in Laramie, Wyoming, for shooting A. J. McAllister at Pine Creek, June 25, over a dispute about two shirts and a cap. The man injured, Smith also received two shots, but the wounds are not dangerous.

A startling proof of the claim that many such cases are affected by tuberculosis has been found at Atascadero, Cal., where the city and county veterinarian, Dr. Orvis, killed and dissected a swine recently in the interests of members of the medical and board of health. The sow was a healthy animal and appeared perfectly healthy, but had a cough. The veterinarian was asked if this animal was diseased. He answered and general looks were against the sow, but on opening the body it was found that there was a large tumor on the lungs. When it was found filled with pus, further tests were discontinued and the victim was sent to the abattoir. The kidneys and heart were not affected, but the liver showed the disease. The disease was so advanced that the officer directed that the body be destroyed.

A specimen of sufferous magnetic pyrite has been received at the museum of the California mining bureau from the now famous War Eagle mine, near Gold Hill, Oregon, U. S. A. This district is located just over the natural line near the northeastern corner of the state of Washington. Early in the year there were about 100 men in the district, but now there are only 20. The tonnage of the mine seems at \$50 per ton contains some copper and iron, and requires smelting. When the mine was first discovered and worked a little time it was believed to be \$100,000, but the parties who took the property out were asked for a little water, copper and iron and then offered for \$1,000,000. There was another mine in the village and the offer of the inevitable British syndicate of \$2,000,000 has been refused. The miners at the mine began to work it, but gave up through lack of water, and have discovered another vein just as rich as the first one. Hundreds are flocking into the territory, and a town rivalling Butte is now being built.

Damage suits against the Ivens and Price Mining company, aggregating more than \$200,000, were filed in the United States district court at Salt Lake City, July 10, by the plaintiff's attorneys and legal representatives, who seek damages for injuries inflicted upon the non-union miners who went to the rescue of the company during the Coeur d'Alene riot in June, 1892. The plaintifis in the suit are represented by George F. Felt, Samuel C. Collins, L. H. Colton, Frank West and Sophia Johnson. The suits brought by each complainant separately, and most of them ask \$20,000 damages. Some have been raised when the miners had been driven up by union miners with 200 pounds of dynamite. The plaintiffs aver that they engaged to work for defendant corporation on the understanding that they were to be protected against all other miners, and that the defendant was to banish them from their obligations, and knew that the union men were armed and desperate, placed plaintiffs in a state of great danger that the plaintiffs did not know. That they were in a position of real danger of life and limb, and that they knew that the defendant was to banish them from their obligations.

The complaint recites that the plaintiffs, who were non-union miners, were sent to the mill without protection from the Warden or State Guard, and that they were to be rid of the miners, and that the union men had driven the miners from the mill was impossible. Plaintiff the union men fired many volleys into the mill, after which the miners left the mill and drove up the hill with their rifles, and the miners were forced to flee.

Their sufferings are described in detail—how some were maimed and others made paraplegic, and others rendered blind, and dead for life. One of the most damning allegations is that the miners were compelled to work the non-union men in their place, demanded by the defendant company, whose agents prevented the United States marshal from communicating with the men in the mill. Bloody battles were exchanged between the two sides, and the miners were driven from the mill.

The miners were compelled to leave the mill, and the non-union miners were compelled to remain.
