## DEDICATION OF WAYNE STAKE TABERNACLE

The visit of President Smith and party in Los on Oct. 22 to 24, 1909, who came to hold stake conference and dedicate the beautiful stake tabernacle just completed at a cost of \$27,000, was a red letter event in Wayne stake. They were met on entering the city of Fremont, Oct. 22, by Sunday school children and officers from every Sunday school in the stake. "How strong," who formed a throng as the party drove up and greeted the president by singing "We thank Thee, O God, for a prophet." President Smith made a short address expressive of the appreciation he felt for the honor shown him, and blessed the assembled children and parents.

At 5 o'clock p. m., Oct. 22, the priesthood meeting was held in the stake tabernacle, with President Smith presiding, and Stake President Gearson presiding, conducting the exercises. There was a good attendance and the report made by President Bastian and the words of commendation for the good work performed in the erection of a splendid tabernacle; the teachings, counsels and admonitions to all holding the priesthood offered by Apostle Smith, President Seymour B. Young, Bishop Smith and President Joseph F. Smith, thrilled those of all present with inspiration and joy.

The first meeting of conference commenced at 10 o'clock a. m., Oct. 23, 1909. There were present of the general authorities of the Church President Joseph F. Smith, Elder Hyrum M. Smith of the council of twelve, President Seymour B. Young of the first council of seventies and David A. Smith of the presiding bishopric, Gearson S. Bastian, Joseph Eckersey and John R. Stewart of the stake presidency, a large number of stake and ward officers, and Wm. D. Brown and Jas. S. Horne of the Sevier stake presidency, and many other visitors from nearby stakes.

President Joseph F. Smith presided and President Gearson S. Bastian conducted the exercises. A very excellent musical program was provided for each session of conference by the stake choir, consisting of singers from the several wards who had been in training under the able management of Prof. John Hood of Boston for two weeks. The anthems composed for the dedicatory services of the Salt Lake temple, Copenhagen meetinghouse, and other anthems were rendered with good effect, and the musical program rendered by the children at the Sunday school session of conference conducted by Prof. Hood was especially pleasing. The singing throughout was an inspiration to the conference.

President Gearson S. Bastian gave a good report of the condition of the stakes and explained the many difficulties encountered in the building of the tabernacle. He expressed gratitude to all who had assisted in any way towards the erection of the building and was especially thankful for the help given by the president and trustee-in-trust, and was pleased to be able to state that the tabernacle committee was able to pay off all obligations in full. He felt to sympathize for the people of God who had given up their homes to abandon their farms and desert their homes that had taken them nearly a lifetime to build, in consequence of the recent floods and washouts, but he believed they would find good homes in the settlements of Fremont or Rabbit valley, and that from this day Wayne county would begin to develop and grow as it had never done before.

Elder Hyrum M. Smith first congratulated the people on the privilege of meeting in the house erected for the works of God. He then delivered an excellent discourse upon the value of scripture reading.

President Joseph F. Smith said he was much gratified to meet so many of the saints on the occasion of his first visit to the stake. He congratulated the president of the stake, his associates and all who had labored for the erection of the tabernacle, which he said was substantial, commodious, beautiful and well adapted for all purposes needed. He hoped that the inhabitants of this home would have a tendency to quiet the spirit of unrest that had been with many of the people living in Wayne stake in the past, and that they would be contented with their homes in this rigid but healthy climate and labor diligently to bring substantial growth and development along all lines of temporal improvement. He knew that God would enrich and bless all who had donated towards the building of a home for his worship. He spoke of the many and varied blessings the Lord has conferred upon his children and showed that we should appreciate the same by a manifestation of faith in God and devotion to his service. He pointed out that all blessings men enjoy are the gift of God, notwithstanding they may labor for them. God gives the power and ability to men to perform all that is or ever will be accomplished

by them. He commended Brother John Hood and the choir for the beautiful singing. He closed by pointing the way to life eternal by acceptance of the principles of repentance and baptism and the living of an upright and godly life. After the singing of an anthem, "Song of the Redeemed," President John R. Stewart offered prayer.

William H. Seegmiller of the Sevier stake was the first speaker of the afternoon session. He referred to the time when Wayne stake was a part of the Sevier stake and it was his pleasure to preface and minister among the people. He delighted in the growth that had been made in the development of the resources of these stakes and always took a lively interest in the persons whom he once presided. This splendid tabernacle, he said, was credit to the people and would be an ornament in any of the stakes of Zion. He related some very interesting events in the settlement of Rabbit valley and showed the power of God as manifested in revelations given to the children of Laman for the preservation and safety of his latter-day Israel in these stakes. He hoped the people of Wayne stake would have need to go to Zion and would make their homes and labor where the Lord had planted them. It matters little where we live so long as we are engaged in God's service. The choir sang the anthem: "In Our Redeemer's Name."

President Seymour B. Young said he rejoiced in the counsels of the Lord, and commended the people for their integrity in maintaining the settlements of this stake in face of the trying ordeal through which they had passed. He spoke at some length upon the necessity for proper sanitary regulations so that the people living in these settlements might enjoy the pure air and water that it is their right and privilege to enjoy as dispensed to them without adulteration from above. He sought by words of earnest counsel to teach the people to be physically strong that they may be spiritually useful and capable of doing valuable service for the Lord.

The Sunday school session of conference was called to order at 10 o'clock a. m., Sunday Oct. 25. The children's choir under the direction of Prof. Hood furnished the singing. After the usual opening exercises and administration of the sacrament, "Let us gather up the sunbeams" was sung by Sister Oberland accompanied by the choir, solo: "Joe's Sweet Story" was sung by Brother John Hood. Claude Blackburn gave a recitation. The children's choir sang "The Holy City."

Elder Young said he was very pleased with the excellent program rendered. He then gave some very good suggestions for Sunday school work and children, and thanked Brother Hood for the interest taken in teaching the children to sing so sweetly.

Bishop Smith spoke pleadingly to the children and in story form exemplified the love and unity that existed in the home and with the family of the prophet of the Lord. He admonished the children to practice the lessons taught in the Sunday schools and honor and obey their earthly and heavenly parents.

Elder Hyrum M. Smith explained in language that the children could understand the revelation of the Father and the Son, the restoration of the gospel and the way back to the Father's presence.

President Smith read from the Doctrine and Covenants relative to the obligations all parents are under to teach their children the principles of the gospel and to live them in the way of temporal life. He explained that no parent, who by their neglect or carelessness, were responsible for their departure from the ways of purity and righteousness could enter their exaltation until they had brought their children to repentance and salvation and they were ready to enter with them. He explained that true men and women cannot be driven or forced to do anything wrong, but are governed and blessed them in the name of the Lord.

At the closing session of conference Sunday afternoon the general and stake authorities were presented and unanimously sustained by the people.

President Joseph F. Smith counseled the congregation to call their children and make preparations to offer the labor of their hands in the erection of the tabernacle to the Lord. He explained that he would make the offering on behalf of the people. The basement or first floor to be set apart for purposes of wholesome amusements and recreation, the second floor or main room in which the congregation has been assembled, to be set apart for the worship of the Lord.

He then spoke at some length upon the importance of proper sanitary regulations so that the people living in these stakes might enjoy the pure air and water that it is their right and privilege to enjoy as dispensed to them without adulteration from above.

He pointed out that no man with a rebellious spirit could ever be saved and that all persons must learn to be subject to the law of God. The Latter-day Saints should be willing to dedicate their substance for the service of God. He then offered the dedicatory prayer, which, inspired by the spirit of God, brought joy and peace unspeakable to the assembled saints.
