

defendant is guilty of murder in the first degree and is not entitled to a recommendation of mercy. The facts will show that on the night of Jan, 6, 1904, the two murdered men, Amasa Gleason and Thomas Brighton, left East Temple street on car No. 77 at about 11:30 o'clock, and made what proved to be their final trip to the end

were sitting in the car waiting for tim to start back to the city. passenger on the car, young lady, left the car before it reached the end. Shortly afterwards she heard several shots fired in the direction of the car. A young man named Beckstead also heard the shots. Mr. Hurd, who lived near the end of the car line, heard the shots and went to the car. He found Gleason in about the middle of the car dead, and Brighton in the south end of the car mortally

about 11 o'clock that night boarded a oar at Second South and East Temple streets and rode to Tenth East street, where he alighted and walked up the hill to Thirteenth East street, the end of the First South street line, where he waited until car 77 arrived. Defendant had a 45-caliber revolver and wore a black hat while on the car. After he got off the car he exchanged his black hat for a light campaign hat which he had concealed about his person. When car No. 77 arrived, we will show that defendant entered the same and at-tempted to rob the street car men. They resisted and he shot them down in cold blood.

### COMPLETE CONFESSION.

"He was arrested the next day by the police and was that evening taken out to the state prison. He was closely questioned by the authorities and on the Sunday following the murder he sent for Chief of Police Lynch and dictated to him a full and complete confession of the crime. These are about the facts, gentlemen of the jury, as they will appear in the evidence introd iced by the state and upon which we will ask you to return a verdict of guilty of

Upon motion of Attorney H. A. Snith, for the defense, Judge Morse made an order excluding all of the witnesses for state from the court room except while they are on the witness stand. As the defendant is the only witness for the defense, such an order was not made with reference to the witnesses for the defense.

## ATTY. HURD CALLED.

The first witness called by the state was Attorney Joseph H. Hurd. Before his testimony commenced, District At-torney Smith produced two photographs of car No. 77 at the end of the line where the murder occurred. They were later introduced in evidence. Mr. Hurd testified that he lives within 20 rods of where the killing occurred and that the photographs were a good likeness of the surroundings at the end of the line. He was well acquainted with Mr. Gleason and rode out on his car on the night of the killing about 11 o'clock. He said that shortly before 12 o'clock he heard three shots in rather quick succession. He looked cut of the window and saw the car standing there and saw a man huddled up in one corner. He thought there was something wrong and went down to the car. Witness saw Mr. Brighton sitting in the southwest cor-Mr. Glenson lying on his face in the middle of the car. Brighton was badly manie of the car. Brighton was bady wounded but recognized the witness. His clothes were smoking and witness saw that he had been shot. Mr Hurd said that he then stepped out of the car and saw Mr. Eleckstead, and asked him to summon medical assistance and go for his father. By this time the streetcar men on the car which left East Temple street at 12 o'clock had arrived and they helped witness take Brighton to Mr. Beckstead's home. Upon cross-examination by Attorney

Wilson, Mr. Hurd said that he did not see a revolver on the floor near Mr. Brighton, He identified Shockley's light hat which was found outside the car,

MISS ANNA HURLING.

The next witness was Miss Annu Hurling, who rode out on car 77 with the two murdered men on what proved to be their last trip. She was employed at the residence of Frank B. Stephens on the night of the murder and got off the car at the end of the line and went to Mr. Stephens' home, arriving there about 12 o'clock. Just as she was locking the door she heard three shots fired. She went up stairs and told Mrs. Stephens about them,
