

nally laid out as a fort 56 rods square, the outside line of the houses connected with pickets, forming the wall. A block meeting house was placed in the south east corner, in the form of a bastion, for protecting the walls. The north west corner was likewise defended by a log bastion containing a piece of artillery. Ten acres in the centre was occupied with private corrals, and a large public corral for securing the stock, which, when the gates of the fort were closed, in connection with very slight guarding, rendered everything safe.

This was commenced in January, 1851, and continued till 1855, the year of the grasshoppers, when the city having been enclosed with a Spanish wall 112 rods square, the public corral was dispensed with, and the private corrals were moved outside the line of the buildings. The grasshoppers destroyed all the crops outside this wall, but the ten acre square was put into vegetables, and although late produced an abundant crop. Thus the people were totally dependant upon the savings of former years for their bread. The city has extended on every hand, but the fencing of the public square, and the dividing it into lots during the grasshopper year, established the four principal streets at the modest width of four rods only. The Mayor and City Council are taking measures to widen these streets to six rods, the width of all the other streets.

The centre of the square is now occupied with a stone church. Owannup, the chief of the Píedes, who occupied this country when we came here, is still in good health. He has always been peaceable, and is the best preserved native in the country.

London, 26.—Michael Barrett, convicted of causing the Clerkenwell explosion, was executed at Newgate to-day.

Vienna.—A formidable revolt has broken out in Bosnia; troops are being rapidly pushed forward from Constantinople to quell the disorder.

Ottawa.—The witness, Turner, who testified against Whelan, was inveigled out last night by three men and brutally beaten. The ruffians have been arrested. Turner has also received threatening letters.

Berlin.—Prussia has taken the initiative steps for the proposed general disarmament. King William has ordered the reduction to be forthwith made in the Landwehr.

Paris.—Marshal Neil, in his official report, declares the Chassepot the best fire-arm known. He also states that these guns are being manufactured in the government arsenal at the rate of six hundred a day.

London.—The great Epsom Derby was run to-day, at Great Epsom Downs. A vast throng was present. Business here is almost entirely suspended. The Prince of Wales and other members of the Royal Family were among the visitors. The weather was fine, and more than usual interest attached to the race in consequence of the heavy amount ventured by the Marquis of Hastings on his horse "Lady Elizabeth." "Blue Gown," owned by Sir Joseph Hawley, and ridden by Wells, was the winner; "King Alfred," owned by Baron Rothschild, was second; "Speculum," belonging to the Duke of Newcastle, was third. The time was two minutes and forty-four seconds; distance a mile and a half. Eighteen horses ran.

Munich.—The treaty for the mutual protection of naturalized citizens, negotiated by Bancroft with the Bavarian Cabinet has been signed.

London.—Warsaw dispatches report that a band of Polish exiles, said to have been re-united in France, have appeared on the frontiers of Galicia, making riotous demonstrations. It is believed the Langiewicz, the leader of the last Polish insurrection, is at the head of these bands.

Albany.—The second trial of General Cole for the murder of Hiscock, is fixed for September 14th.

New York, 28.—The Herald's Montreal special says the troops in the garrison here are under orders. The soldiers' wives at St. John's have been ordered out of the barracks. Hospitals are being made ready. Government detectives are marching to the frontier.

Washington.—Information has been received that the Provisional Government of Crete has decided to convene a regular parliament; elections are now being held in all parts of the Island. Another battle occurred near Sphakur on the 3d of May, in which the Cretans

drove the Turks from two block of houses they had recently built.

Savannah, Ga.—Great enthusiasm is manifested over the final defeat of impeachment; many public buildings and private residences were illuminated in honor of the event.

Havana, 18.—A proclamation has been issued calling upon all citizens to get under arms. Salnave made a general attack upon the rebel lines on the 16th, but was repulsed, the troops falling back into the city. The Federal steamer *Desoto* arrived on the 17th, being short of provisions. She sailed to Key West, despite the protestations of the American Minister, who had promised to secure the lives of all Americans and those who had taken refuge in the legation. The general attack was renewed on the south side of the city on the 18th; the result was unknown when the mail left.

London.—The *Daily News* thinks that Johnson merely escaped, and was not acquitted, and considers that the strength of the Radicals is not materially impaired.

The *Post* thinks the Radicals ought to be pleased with their own defeat, and says they eventually will be.

The *Telegraph* argues that the court was above partizanship, hence the verdict was a true one.

London.—Dispatches from Berlin say that in well informed circles at Vienna and in Hanover the rumors of the Polish insurrection on the Gallician frontier is discredited.

Paris.—Rio Janeiro dates to the 9th have been received. The latest accounts state that a decisive battle was about to take place before Humaita. Dispatches from the allied camp state that the bombardment of the Paraguayan stronghold by the land and naval batteries had ceased, orders having been given for a general assault on the works.

New York, 29.—Haytian advices to the 26th, via Havana, say that Salnave's adherents had recaptured the fortress on the south side of Port au Prince, which was recently taken by the rebels. Delorme, Salnave's Prime Minister, becoming alarmed at his own unpopularity and the critical situation of the Government, had tendered his resignation, which Salnave refused to accept. Salnave had ordered a conscription of 500 men for a National Guard. Nyssajo aspires to the Presidency. His forces are expected at the capital. Salnave is preparing for a desperate resistance. The British war steamer *Phoebe* arrived on the 18th, and was hailed by foreigners with great rejoicing; but she sailed to Jamaica. The foreign consuls still refuse to surrender the refugees in their consulates.

London.—The Brazilian mail steamer brings the following news: General Lopez was at the junction of the Zinebarga and Paraguay Rivers, where he had succeeded in concentrating a large force in a strong position. He was well supplied with provisions and war materials. Communication with the interior is unimpaired.
