Slot Machines Must Go and Other Forms of Gambling Interdicted.

MOBAL WAVE STRIKES CITY.

fatoons Are to be More Closely Regulated and Probably Closed On Sunday.

Ogden, Dec. 6 .- Gambling and saloon keeping in Ogden will be more stringently regulated in the future, and once more the slot machines must be removed.

Some months ago a raid was made by the police on the slot machines in Ogden and every one was removed from the saloons and other places, but gradually they were replaced, and run as briskly as ever. A conference has been held between

Halverson, Sheriff Bailey and his deputies, Captain of Police and his deputies, captain of Police Brown and Detective Pender on the proposition and it was decided to noti-fy the owners of the machines to im-mediately close them up or else suffer punishment. Dist, Atty, Halverson is determined in the matter and says that the law must be complied with, that these evils must be stopped, and that he will use his authority to the fullest extent to stop the same. When the slot machine evil has been remedied, the officers will direct their attention to compling and the sales business. to gambling and the saloon business. Gambling may be entirely wiped out in Ogden and the saloon men may be re-quired to close their places at midnight every Saturday night and remain closed for 24 hours over Sunday.
