

burgh of Cork, but no damage was done. It is probable that Healy, member for Wexford, will be suspended for the remainder of the session this week. Healy, who is a nephew of the brothers A. M. and D. Sullivan, is the youngest and wisest member of the Parnell party. He was Parnell's secretary during the latter's trip to America, and possesses almost as good a knowledge of parliamentary rules as his chief. Mr. Biggar is in poor health, and Healy has taken his place as chief obstructionist.

It is said that the Castle authorities have received evidence of a plot to kill Mr. Forster. Hitherto the chief secretary has travelled to and fro between London and Dublin without guard or escort of any kind. On his arrival by the royal mail steamer at Kingston pier, he is invariably greeted with groans and cries of "Buckshot," but no violence has been attempted. In the future, however, the time of his arrival and departure will be kept secret, and his special train to Dublin will be well guarded. The chief secretary's lodge in Phoenix Park has been guarded by double sentries for some time. Mr. Forster is probably the most unpopular man in Ireland since the days of Lord Castlereagh.

ST. LOUIS, 14.—In Northwest Missouri on Sunday, a large amount of property was destroyed, considerable lives lost and a great many persons injured. Those known to have been killed outright are R. C. Nelson, C. Maynard, Miss Maynard, Mrs. Roberts and child, and a man, name unknown. Injured, Miss A. Gee, who will die; Miss Maynard, severely; Wm. Miller, dangerously; Robert Miller, seriously. Bruised, Israel Wood and children. Frank Burke and a company of 14 persons were injured and bruised. John Cott and family have since died. Wm. Ricks, severely; Mrs. Ricks fatally; Mrs. Richards, right arm and ribs broken.

Houses were blown away belonging to James Bolger, Wm. Elwood, Mrs. J. Benham, Job Pierce, L. G. Dangerfield, Isaac Boyle, George Purviance, Israel Wood, L. Garrett, R. C. Nelson, John Cott, Frank Burke, Bloomer Dungan, Dr. Dunne, J. Meeks, Mrs. McIntyre, Wm. Borham, Miss Bevin, Geo. Roberts, Randolph Newman, Wilkes Meeks, those in Baltimore, M. H. Hartwell, South Berlin, Phil. Asmaus.

The greatest destruction took place at or near King City and Flag Springs.

Later in the evening another cyclone passed north of Savannah, Andrews county. From information received, it appears a cloud formed in a field near Losbroy Chapel, about eight miles northwest of Savannah, and moved southeast, tearing timber, trees and fences until it struck the large brick house of Nathan C. Kellogg, situated about six miles north of town, which it tore to pieces. Mr. Kellogg and family were absent from home at the time and escaped being injured. Two horses belonging to Mr. Kellogg in a field near the house were found in a field a quarter of a mile away, supposed carried there by the cyclone. The cloud then moved east, and at this time was about 160 yards wide.

The next building in its way was the residence of Mr. J. Hall, situated near the toll bridge. It struck the corner of the house, moving it off the foundation and damaging it considerably. W. S. Wright and 50 hogs killed. John Parks' house, further on, was blown away, and Mrs. Parks severely injured. Helman's house, was carried away and the Baptist Church, near by, torn to pieces. Mrs. Laughlin's house, further on, was blown to pieces. The furniture, clothing and everything contained in the house were carried away. Feather beds were torn to pieces and the feathers strewn all through the timbers. Stoves and all kinds of household goods from the houses were carried through the air, and the owners have not yet found any of them. Linn Roberts' and E. A. Phillips' houses, near Fishpond, were destroyed. From there the storm passed on to Flag Springs and King City. The cyclone was a quarter of a mile wide and very violent. Fully two-thirds of the houses blown away were occupied by families being away from home, either abroad or visiting, otherwise the loss of life would have been frightful.

ALBANY, 14.—Bradley testified that there was no discord or factional fight between him and Sessions, although all of the party did not endorse Sessions' action at Chicago. He thought that he did not tell C. P. Ingersoll that he had voted for Conkling and Platt for the last

time, and would not make a direct answer as to whether he told Dunne, of the New York Times, that he would vote for Depew hereafter. He did not think he told him or Lyman B. Smith, of the Buffalo Courier, that outside money was given witness by a lobbyist, and was positive that he did not tell F. M. Miller, of Chataqua, so. He did not remember saying in Kelley's cigar store in Olean on Sunday, that there was consternation in store for the people at Albany. He thought he did say he could get \$500 for voting for Depew, and at the same time please his constituency, but said he would not do it. He did not tell the postmaster that he could get \$7,500 to vote for Depew. He thought from street and newspaper talk, that some members of the legislature could be bought. His was the only case in which he knew of an offer being made except, perhaps, Mr. Young's; recess.
