John George, of the Seymour Creek Indians, drowned.

A LARGE CATTLE PURCHASE.

A lady Medical Student has a Narrow Escape—Severity of Water in Toes.

San Diego, Cal., has a sewer system which is one year old and fifteen feet high.

Operating began last week on the Marquette and Wyoming railroad extension between Marquette and Mead, Ark.

Plans for a telegraph line between Cheyenne and Rawlins have been set for a distance of twenty-three and one-half miles. It is understood the line will begin operation in about six weeks. It is also planned that a new line will be run to the White Rock mine.

The Deseret Leader says that E. H. Farson, a San Joaquin cattle company, has purchased 2,000 head of cattle from the ranches of White Pine, Nevada and Idaho counties. The average price paid for the herd delivered at Marquette was \$10 per head. They were given to a Mexican fellow, John.

The Deseret Leader says that the Indians are continuing to show the severity of water. The Indians are compelled to cut it with a half crop and a small one at that, to keep it from drying up. The water is so low that it is utterly impossible to properly irrigate it.

Wednesday morning at 5 A.M. the San Joaquin Telegraph, Atwater, California, received a电報 from the Indians by sending two Indians to the post office. About a week ago the Indians left the hotel and since then the girl has been dependent.

A dispatch from Vancouver, B.C., says: "Walsh is exterminating the Indians on the mainland of British Columbia. Recently Chief George of the Capilano was found dead, having been shot at his house while asleep, and Wednesday Chief Gispa of the Seymour creek Indians, one of the most important tribes of the province, was also found drowned. At the impact it transpired that he had a large bullet hole in his forehead and a smaller one in his shoulder. A large bullet hole was also found in his chest, but the chief's relatives cannot tell how he came to death, and it is feared that while still drunk the chief was murdered."

A民族, Colo., dispatch says: There was at the morning hours in the body of a young Indian woman found near the town of Durango, Colo., McCloud, 800 Miles.² On his left arm were tattooed the initials "H." and a butcher's emblem, which consisted of a cleaver with a knife and a sharpening steel crossed. On the right arm was another tattooed emblem of an animal.

Grasshoppers or locusts are not eating everything green around Wheatland, U.S.A., a dispatch, nor are they a menace to the crops of Sutter and Yuba counties, as was published a few days ago. The locusts and grasshoppers which infest these areas have been hatched this season, and larvae hatching along grain fields in the shade of a tree or bushes, are literally alive with them. Small gardens and no gardens have suffered, but some larger gardens naturally attract the insects. On the fertile bottom land of Bear river, where it is planted in hops, onions, vineyards, alfalfa, corn and other green crops, no hopers are to be seen.

The Phoenix Chronicle, The Los Angeles Times, the Southern Pacific and San Fran. Po. to publish a reduced rate on sending oranges and Mediterranean seeds between California, common ports and the eastern markets, less than the cost of their transportation.

The San Fran. Po. to charge \$1 per 100 pounds in carload lots of fruit less than 25,000 pounds. This will go into effect on the 1st inst. and remain in force for thirty days. This action has been taken in response to a demand from the orange growers in Southern California, who found the rate of \$1.25, too high to permit the marketing of their crops in the East at a profit. The rate of \$1.25 on avocados and other varieties will remain unchanged.

François Journeau, a lady student in the Haskins medical college, assay the San Fran. Chronicle, narrowly escaped being totally injured Wednesday evening while crossing Market street, opposite Powell. As she stepped from the sidewalk to cross, only to be struck by another motor car. The gripman quickly applied the brakes and saved her from being crushed under the wheels. As the receiving hospital was found that she had only bruised about the back and hips, but no serious result is anticipated.

The gold Mountain camp are booming, say the Household Advertiser, and most all the property owners are busy engaged working, buying, selling or trading. Mining men from all parts of the country are here, and many of them intend to remain in gold fields. The district is showing up some good mines. The Silver King has struck the largest body of ore ever discovered here. Capitalists are especially anxious to buy the ground and a sixty stamp mill to be erected. The Silver King and mine are running day and night and every thing is going favorably. The Hercules mine is doing some very well, and the town and camp are in the active life of our camp. The owners of the Hercules, at a recent meeting, are continuing to develop the property with their own capital instead of handing over royalties. Four men are employed on the Hercules striking a stock.
