LOCAL BRIEFS.

BEER SOLD ON CARS AT BINGHAM SUNDAY

County Commissioners Investigate Illegal Sale of Liquor Allocated to Be Practised by Brewers.

The county commissioners at their meeting yesterday afternoon took up the illegal sale of liquor practiced by the brewers in the county and laid the matter before County Atty. Job P. Lyon and Sheriff Joseph C. Sharp with directions to prosecute all cases. The Sunday selling question was discussed and any saloon man caught violating the ordinance will have his license revoked. By several of the saloonmen in Bingham Junction and Bingham canyon, it is charged that the brewers in Salt Lake send a carload of bottled beer out to the mining camps the latter part of every week. It is generally sold from the car on Sunday or any other day. This is being investigated by the deputy sheriffs.

The commissioners confirmed the appointment of William Anderson as an extra deputy clerk in the county recorder's office to prepare plans for the county assessor at \$3 a day.

County Atty. Job P. Lyon, deputy at large in the county, would not be needed after July 15.

Mayor Hyrum Goff and several other officials of Midvale, which is the new name of Bingham Junction met with the commissioners yesterday for a short time and discussed the affairs of the new city. The officials made arrangements to take over the public utilities owned there by the county and will also rent the jail building which is owned by the county. The formal proposition of the town will be received at the commissioners' next meeting.
