HERBERT METZGER HANGED. He Died Protesting that He Was

Innocent.

Helena, Mont., May. 5 .- A special to the Record from White Sulphur the Record from White Sulphur Springs, says Herberi H. Meizger was hanged about 3 p. m. today for the murder of Homer Ward last Thanks-giving day. Meizger's neck was not broken, death resulting from strangu-lation, and he was pronounced dead in eleven and a half minutes. His re-markable noive did not desert him, and he died without showing any evidences of weakening. He maintained his inno-cence to the end. He left a written statement to be made public in the course of which he reiterated his denial of the crime.

course of which he reiterated his denial of the crime. The dead body of Ward, Metzger's victim was found partly burned in the bed in his cabin, where he lived alone. A bullet hole in the head showed the monner of death. The murderer had evidently tried to cover up the crima by invoking the aid of fire. The bed clothing had been saturated with kero-sene and set fire, but the flames failed to do their part. Ward had evidently been shot through the window as he was eating his dinner. One of his farm was eating his dinner. One of his farm buildings was also burned. Robbery was evidently the motive, as some of Ward's effects were found in Metzger's possession when he was arrested sever-al weeks after the discovery of the

crime. Metzger was only 29 years old, and is said to belong to a good family, living in Pierce, near Akron, O. He did every-thing possible to keep from his family the news of his conviction, often saving he did not care so much about dying as he did the result upon his relatives.

TREATY WITH GERMANY.

Hoped that Those Conducting Negotiation Will Meet Early.

Berlin, May 5 .--- The foreign officials hope that plenipotentiaries representing the United States and Germany will meet early in the autumn to ne-gotiate a commercial treaty, and that the exchange of preliminary proposits will take place some time later in the summer. Although Germany's com-munication of March 14 was altogether a definite statement that the tariff agreement with the United States of July 16, 1600, would terminate by March July 10, 1900, would terminate by March 1, 1906, yet it is not called a denun-ciation which is not necessary before Dec. 1, 1905, or after three months' no-
