COLOMBIA AND

Interview With Gen. Uribe-Uribe Declares He is Loyal to His Country.

New York, Nov. 12 .- A dispatch to the Herald from Bogota, Colombia

says: The Colombian government has accepted the proffered mediation of Chili to settle the troubles between Colombia and Venezuela. In behalf of his government, Senor Herboso, the Chillan minister in Bogota, made the offer. Minister Herboso cabled to President Castro the same offer.

Acting President Marroquin has replied to the resolution or the Pan-American congress, which appealed to Colombia to have a peaceful solution of her difficulties with President Castro's government. Dr. Marroquin said in re-ply that Colombia desires to have an amicable settlement with Venezuela. The Colombian government prefers to be on cordial terms with Venezuela, and its grievances are en irely against President Castro's government. The Colombia minister of foreign affairs, Senor Mendez, said in an interview that the Ecuadoran government had of-ficially announced that it would pre-

GEN. URIBE-URIBE INTERVIEW.

Maracaibo, Venezuela, Oct. 31.-(Correspondence Associated Press.)-A cor-respondent of the Associated Press has just had an interview with Gen. Uribe-Uribe. He found the general strongly encamped in the Cordilleras mountains on the feature line for strongly encamped in the Cordilleras mountains, on the frontier line between the Venezuelan state of Tachira and the Colombian province of Santander. His headquarters were at a hamlet called Lusiana, half a day's ride from San Cristobal, capital of Tachira. His command, numbering several thousand Colombian liberals, were holding the extreme left of the Vene-zuelan line of defense, covering the ap-proaches of San Cristobal and the En-centrados raliroad from the direction

centrados railroad from the direction of Cucuta. Gen. Chalbant Cordenne held the center, with Gen. Modesto Castro at the extreme right.

On the Colombian side Gen. Valen-cla, a former minister; Juan Berti and Rangel Carbiras, the Venezuelan rebel, are in command. Altogether some 16,-009 soldlers stand face to face on the frontier. Skirmishes and raids across the frontier are of daily, or rather, of mightly occurrence

nightly occurrence. Gen. Uribe-Uribe, sp French, said: "President Castro has but recently declared this is not an in-ternational war between Venezuela and colombia, but a struggle between the Colombia, but a struggle between the liberal and conservative parties of both countries. Here in Venezuela we all serve under the yellow standard of Ecuador, Guatemala, Nicaragua and in the liberal stronbholds of the Colom-bian guajira.
