


L.L. Downing to Look After Wool

New Office Created on the Harriman Lines Which Has Been Accepted by the Commercial Agent of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, Who Waxed His Resignation Yesterday Afternoon—Another Plum for a Salt Laker.

The reason of the mysterious visits of the Illinois freight traffic manager of the Union Pacific to Salt Lake at the end of last month in the record of 500 car loads which he secured this year for his road, is one which has never been explained by any rail road agent in this territory. Mr. Downing has a large clientele among the bondholders of the roads and his thorough knowledge of the business in addition to his practical operations in this territory gives him a decided handicap over all others. It did not take the "Maddington" long, according to reports, to capture his mind and the result was that he signed his resignation to his former office, F. A. Nash, general agent of the Milwaukee at Ogallala yesterday.

The resignation goes into effect Oct. 1, and after which date Mr. Downing will have charge of all the road business in the Union Pacific and its extensions, the Oregon Short Line, the Southern Pacific and the Oregon Trail & Navigation, although just what his title will be is not at this time forthcoming. The catch point however, has been disclosed and that is that he will be seconded and that is to say he will be a salaried employee very nearly par

to large as that he has been getting with the Milwaukee, and he was one of the best paid commercial agents that had sat at the headmarters.

He has been in the past few years here as a representative of the timber and lumber trade, the timber case, the wood that originated in the timber, and the author this year from a San Joaquin, Wyoming, Oregon and Colorado States has been on his side, and it is only that the road business is essentially the largest thing in the west for him to pick over.

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Mr. Downing has been connected with the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul in this city in the capacity of commercial agent since Nov. 1, 1887, prior to which time for two years he was traveling freight agent for the Chicago & Northwestern, with head quarters in Denver. He entered the railroad service in 1869 as telegraph operator for the Cleveland & Toledo now the Lake Shore & Michigan South, since which he has been successively to live in various capacities of commercial telegraph operator, chief dispatcher and rail master, Lake Shore, Michigan Southern, Wabash, Lake Erie & Western, Ohio & Central, L. & N., H. & C. and Texan, South Pac. and Pueblo, Denver & & & Co. and Pacific, San Francisco, 1889 to 1891, with the traffic department. When at Denver 1892 to 1894, agent Red Rock Trans Co., Salt Lake City; 1894 to 1895, contracting agent for the Denver & Rio Grande at San Francisco.
