President Can-non's remarks can be costrued in only one way, and that is as a declaration of war on organized labor. "And this brings up the matter of Senator-elect Smoot. Mr. Smoot is one of the Twelve Apostles—one of the twelve men who control this Church that has injected itself grautiously into this labor difficulty in which it is in no wise concerned. Mr. Smoot owes allegiance first, last and all the time, like every other Mormon, to his Church. If he be permitted to sit in the United States senate he will, of course, follow If he be permitted to sit in the United States senate ha will, of course, follow the mandate of his Church, and, like the other leaders, act as a foe to or-ganized laber. This cannot be permit-ted. We will carry the war into Af-rica and fight Mr. Smoot. A national movement will be started to array union labor against the interference of the Mormon hierarchy in politics and in industrial disputes."
