New Law Does Not Require Immediate Action Of Councils.

An act amending section 195 of the Re-vised Statutes of Utah, 1898, and relating to the mayor's veto in cities of the first and accord class. Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Utah: Section I-TEAN section 195 of the Re-vised Statutes of Utah, 1838, be, and the same is hereby amended to read as fol-tows:

195-In cities of the first and second class every resolution adopted, or contract ap-proved by the city council appropriating or involving the expenditure of mouey, and every ordinance passed, shall within 21 hours after the action of the city coun-I nours after the action of the city count (1, be presented to the mayor for his ap-roval; if he approves the ordinance, res-lution of contract, as the case may be o shall sign the same; if not, he shall re-orn it with his objections in writing to turn it with his objections in writing to the city recorder, who shall present the same to the city council at the next regu-lar meeting thereof. The council shall cause the objections of the mayor to be entered at large upon the minutes, and proceed to reconsider the ordinance, reso-lution or contract, as the case may be which shall stand for consideration had been made and carried, and the ordin-ance, contract, and the ordin-ance contract or resolution shall be open ince, contract or resolution shall be open

heigh a motion for reconsideration and seen made and carried, and the ordin-ince, contract or resolution shall be open or debate or amendment the same as if in final passage in the first instance. The juestion shall be stated in the following orm. "Shall the ordinance, contract or resolution, as the case may be, pass not-shibstanding the objection of the mayor thereto". The vote on this question may be postponed one weak out not longer. If the ordinance, contract or resolution, as the case may be, is amended or changed in any manner it may be again passed by a majority vote and sent to the mayor for his approval, and if signed by him, it shall become valid as if never vetoed. A second veto shall take the same course as the first. If, when the question of the passage of the ordinance, contract or reso-lution over, the veto is put, two-thirds of all the members of such coundly officer shall certify that fact on the ordinance, contract or resolution, at leading officer as an authentic act, and shall be de-posited in the officer of the sith recorder as an authentic act, and shall be valid and become an ordinance, contract or reso-lution in the same manner and with like effect as it it had received the approval of the mayor. If the mayor shall fail for five days to return to the city recorder the ordinance, resolution or contract so presented to him for his approval the same shall thereafter become valid in like imanner as if it had been approved by him; provided, that if any such resolu-tion, contract or ordinance contains sev-eral items of appropriations of morey, he may object to one or more of slich items, while approving other portions of the orwhile approving other portions of the while approving other portions of the in such case he shall appear or more of such item while approving other portions of the or-linguise. In such case he shall append to he ordinance at the time of signing it, a statement of the item or items which he declines to approve, together with his easiens therefor, and such item or items dail not take effect unless passed over he mayor's objection, in the same man-ter as ordinances appropriating or in-olving the expenditure of money are massed over his veto. Section 2-This act shall take effect up-m approval.
