

EIGHTY-TWO BODIES ARE RECOVERED

Taken From Mine of Pittsburgh-Buffalo Coal Co. at Marianna, Pennsylvania.

MANY HORRIBLY MUTILATED.

But Little Doubt That Death List Will Reach at Least Hundred and Thirty-Eight Men.

Pittsburgh, Nov. 30.—Eighty-two bodies had been recovered from the Marianna mine of the Pittsburgh-Buffalo coal mine at 8 o'clock this morning. Many were horribly mutilated. Thirty more bodies have been located and will be brought to the surface. Of the victims 23 Americans have been identified.

Miners remained in the mine all night working in four-hour shifts to facilitate the work of rescue. All the headings with the exception of two left headings were penetrated and it is said that little difficulty was experienced as a result of falls of slate and coal. All dangers from other explosions is past, it is said today.

Cavener W. S. Sipe of Washington county, said today that no time had been set for an inquest but the jury in an effort to secure data would descend into the mine shortly, that the jurors might be familiar with the conditions.

John H. Jones, president of the Pittsburgh-Buffalo Coal company, today stated that the company's representatives had checked the names of 120 miners whom they knew were in the mine at the time of the explosion and he does not believe the list of dead will exceed that number. One hundred and twelve bodies have been located and Mr. Jones believes the number will total between 115 and 130.

The work of identifying the victims is going steadily. Between 150 and 200 weeping men, women and children lined up in front of the morgue this morning awaiting their turns to claim their dead.

A force of 22 undertakers are preparing the bodies as fast as they are brought to the surface.

There is little doubt that the death list will reach at least 138 men. Officials of the company, who last night stated that over 120 had been killed, now admit that 138 men went down the shaft to work Saturday morning according to miners and others familiar with the number of men generally employed in the mine, the death list will exceed the company's estimate by at least 50.

It is possible that the exact number of men killed will never be known.

Arms, legs or heads were missing from some, and the trunks of others were burned, bruised and cut.

Two of the men had been suffocated and their bodies were not even scratched. One of the victims, a 17-year-old son of John H. Jones, president of the Pittsburgh-Buffalo Coal company, owners of the mine, who was headtimekeeper. His body was found beneath a coal digging machine and it was apparent that the man had crawled there in an effort to escape the deadly fumes.

The body of the other man was found near 11th. The unfortunate soul placed his face in a pool of water.

While miners are advised to do when an explosion occurs, in a desperate attempt to fight off suffocation until rescued.

Sunday afternoon the coroner of Washington county held a meeting to organize a jury and then adjourned until all of the bodies have been taken from the mine.

Early yesterday a small fire broke out in the mine. The blaze was extinguished before serious damage was done.

Reports have been in circulation all day that a second more terrible explosion is likely to occur at any moment. The company officials assert this is not true. There is considerable gas in the mine, however, it is estimated that one-fourth of the victims are Americans.

The work of rescue is being carried on as rapidly as possible. At short intervals the men are sent into the mine to relieve others. Owing to the dangerous gases and wreckage, the work is slow and is being carried on with great precaution. Experts from Pennsylvania and West Virginia are in charge and are being materially assisted by J. W. Paul and Clarence Hall of the United States experimental and testing station of Pittsburgh. Notwithstanding the isolation of Marianna, many persons found their way there Sunday.

David G. Jones, president of the company, came to the city last night. When he left the mine, he said 34 bodies had been recovered, of which 13 had been fully identified. The company, he said, could only account for 138 men in the mine at the time of the explosion. Searches already made convince those in the scene that all were dead. The only man who escaped from the mine after the explosion, Fred Engle, it is said tonight, sustained injuries from which it is believed he can't recover.
