

BARTH JOINED THEM.

The County Court adjourned yesterday at today's session.

NOTHING ABOUT PAST TROUBLES.

A long program of legal cases

takes up greater part of the morning.

The case has healed, and it is presumed that the business of the County court will now run along so smoothly as though nothing had intervened to distract the even tenor of its way. The territorial sessions court denied last Friday that Messrs. Bamberg and Morris, the newly-elected selectmen, were entitled to take their seats without further notice was, acting on this ruling, Judge Hartman, who had before him the old selectmen—Messrs. Hardy and Barth—thus meeting joined the new party.

At 10 o'clock his honor came into the court room with a smile and a "good morning," and took his accustomed seat as chairman of the board without a word of reference to the latter past. The three newselectmen—Messrs. Calumet, Bamberg and Morris—were also present, and the regulars' seats were of the usual routine character.

On motion of Selectman Bamberg, seconded by Selectman Calumet, the minutes of the former meeting were read and confirmed.

A CASE FOR RELIEF.

A poor woman who gave the name of Louise Davies, and she has two children dependent upon her for support, applied to the court to assist her in the payment of her rent, which she had been unable to meet. She had no resources from her husband, and was without means.

NOT WITH HER.

Mr. Muir, supervisor of sugar house ward, attended before the court and advised that an allowance be made for certain repairs to be made under his control.

The court was not, at this time, prepared to grant the request, and so informed Mr. Muir.

THE SICKNESS DIES ON.

Henry Wilson, an old man about 30 years of age, who had been an inmate of the poor house, bobbed up out of trouble. He said he came up town to attend the old fandango entertainment at the Hotel Wilson, and his friends and they gave him a sum of whisky. This took effect upon him, and when he returned to the poor house Superintendent Hinman refused to admit him.

Judge Hinman remanded Wilson that the court might have time to consider the case before the court he acted leniently and obtained it. When on the judge met this man on the street that day, he was then well.

The court, however, resolved to give Wilson another chance, and issued an order for his readmission to the institution. Wilson was present in thanks as he slowly bowed himself out of the room.

ANOTHER FUGITIVE EXHAUSTED.

A sickly-looking fellow named Roberts was ordered admitted to the poor house during the court's pleasure. He is ill with heart disease and has already been an expensive subject to the county.

COURT AND PROVISIONS ALLOWED.

Strangely enough, Walker upon the trial of the instant of an indigent widow, Mrs. A. A. Anderson, who said she had not heard of her son, the "wounded" with another woman, five years. She had four children to sustain, besides having three others in California.

She was allowed \$5 per provisions and half a dozen of coal.

A DEFENDING CASE.

The wife of runaway ex-policeman Green, who left with three young children, is still in a very delicate condition of this time, sent in an application for protection. The investigating board resolved to make Mrs. Green an allowance of \$7 per week "when the proper time arrives."

HE CAME TO THE WRONG PLACE.

Pete Mackinaw, a man subject to fits, had been sent down from Grand Junction, Colorado, to be received here, but the board declined to accept him as a permanent resident. It appears that the man's friends resided in Colorado, to which place Judge Barth thought he should have been sent, instead of to Salt Lake.

Selectman Bamberg was authorized to obtain the best rate he could for the shipment of Mackinaw to Chicago.

HOW SOON?

Selectman Morris here asked Judge Barth—How soon do you expect to get your commission?

The judge—Why, that may come by any day now.

Morris—Then I move that Selectman Bamberg be appointed a committee with him to act in the case of indigent persons, making immediate relief, during the pleasure of the County court.

This was seconded and approved.

HE TOO, MUST GO HOME.

Selectman Hinman intimated, in presence of old man named A. Anderson, a trustee who is unable to sustain his widow's care of himself. Mr. Hinman said that Anderson belonged to Butte, Montana, with a sum of two dollars in his pocket, and for Lemont, where he had been unable to spend nearly all of it. He then paid his fare to Ogallala, and with a \$5 balance got up an hotel there until it was all "blended." Then he went to Cheyenne, remained there a short time, and eventually sent to Salt Lake City, the authorities. He had a son and two daughters in Butte who were able to take care of him. The board decided to return the old man to the Oregon portion.

THE COUNTY JAIL REPAIRS.

Sheriff McQuinn was authorized to have made certain necessary repairs in the tower at the county jail.

DODGE SALVATION.

Wm. F. Angier, chairman of a large delegation to the annual national convention of the Seventh-day Adventist Association, arrived yesterday, and presented a lengthy petition setting forth the facts. The sum of \$500 was allowed, the balance of the amount being referred to the county commissioners.

The board then took up a long list of individual claims, and those reported the remainder of the morning went the most adjournment.

A recess was taken till 2 p.m.

MISS PLEASANT.

Miss Pleasant, Jan. 16.—Barney J. Nielsen, the man on whom the attempt was made to kill by shooting some four weeks ago, died suddenly last night at 11 o'clock. This comes as a surprise as he told some of his friends yesterday that he was feeling much better and his recovery was confidently expected. His death was immediately caused by heart affection to which he had been subject and which was aggravated by the gun shot wound. An account of his return home Saturday from the east and the illness was furnished by his family who were advised. Funeral preparations will be arranged later.

LUCKY, AFTER ALL.

Mrs. C. L. Christie, an Eastern lady who has been on a trip to the coast and is staying at the St. James hotel, lost yesterday her purse containing \$100 in bills, a \$100 check and between ten and eleven dollars in money. As a result, she felt considerably embarrassed. Today the missing articles were returned to her, having been picked up by an old gentleman who did not give his name.

Mr. Christie, however, professed himself lucky at least twice since leaving home. While in San Francisco he had the misfortune to lose his gold watch and chain. He reported the matter to the chief of police of that city and the articles were soon afterward recovered.

Editor Deserved Death.

The people of this place and vicinity made arrangements to have a Christmas tree on December 24th. The tree was dressed and lighted with colored lights, and there was the traditional Santa Claus, impersonated by Mrs. H. E. Marbury. There was a short program before the distribution of the toys and presents which was carried out with success. Santa Claus came up to the establishment of the delighted children who were covered with flakes of cotton falling from head to foot. It was a most enjoyable affair until the cotton caught fire. In less than half a minute it was out of control, and the entire building was a mass of flames. The editor of the Turk City Herald, who had just received the German daily, was directly in it in this day, in time to hear that which would bring him to his grave. The last thing he did was to call out to his wife, "Get the children out of the building, we must have a fire extinguisher." She did as he directed, and ran away. There was a wagon cover having over a capacious trunk at the tree while the committee was trimming it. One of the spectators first presence of mind enough to think of it and he ran and opened it. The burning Santa Claus was all alone so quickly that the children ran to the door and expected the damage that might have been done had a panic ensued.

The skin was burned off. Brother Marbury's face, his ears were very tame, partly burned as also his left hand, but the right hand was not much worse. It had not been for the sake of cover, and the prompt assistance. It was burned at the time by some that he would have his eyesight, but thanks to kind Providence it is progressing favorably and will be able to be out in a week or two.
