DRANK HIMSELF TO DEATH.

John Miklebrothers, After Years of Dissipation, Dies in Jail.

As the result of a protracted spree and a severe attack of dilirium tremens. John Miklebrothers, who was arrested last Saturday morning, died in the city

jail at 9:45 this morning. Miklebrothers literally killed himself with drink. He came here from Texas about 15 years ago, and it is said he was a heavy drinker at that time. Jaller Sol Kimball knew the unfortu-nate man well and he said that for a long time Miklebrothers lived a sober, industrious life. About two years ago
