The Third District Judges Take Up the Law and Motion Calendar.

ELDRIDGE TUTIS ESTATE UP AGAIN

Fruit Tree Inspector Fines Entering the Ordinance Requiring Trees to Be Sprayed.

In the Third district court today Judges Merritt and Harlan took up the law and motion calendar. A number of judgments were also entered.

LOCAL ADVISORY BOARD

An organization effected last night to be after with private interests.

A meeting held at the Deseret National Bank last night, a local advisory board of the American Safety Company of New York, was organized for the purpose of doing away with private ownership. The board is composed of J. H. Hill, resident vice-president, Mrs. McWayne, second resident vice-president, W. H. McCormick, M. H. Walker, John C. Collier, Geo. M. Scott, Boyd Park, Geo. A.

Lyon, Geo. W. Wallace, and Geo. L. Scott, recent assistant secretary.

The company is the largest of the American safety company of New York. Its purpose is to issue bonds of various kinds, arrangements to be made with the board, the board to act as agent with Geo. T. Scott, assistant secretary.

In the new organization three classes of bonds may be marketed through this board. The principal class includes bonds of small, medium, intermediate, large, all-inclusive, and long-term, and the other classes or the majority of such bonds, exclusive, convertible, floating, etc., and the commercial, insurance bonds, and contracts of asbestos, revere glass, mineral, guaranteed bonds and contracts.

This company has capital of \$2,000,000 and a reserve fund of \$1,000,000, and is doing business in all principal cities between New York and San Francisco, and its bonds are issued by the New York company, the local board acting as agents.
