Tampico, Mex., July 20.-In Don Acceltda, a suburb of Tampico, fiftyeight Bahama negroes, contract laborers on the Mexican Central railroad, started a riot today over one of their number being arrested. Many nearoes took the part of their country-men, severely beating a policeman. The Mexican populace took sides with the pollcemen, a pitched battle ensuing.

Fighting continuously, the column with difficulty reached the station at the Ajasandzian, where, on July 8th, it was surrounded by Chinese troops. Re-Inforcements were sent and the withdrawal of the column was effected to Daschizao, with forty-eight casualties,

Daschizao, with forty-eight casualties, killed, wounded and missing. The railway from Mukden to Telin and Daschizao has been completely de-stroyed and the fate of the workmen and railway officials north of Mukden is not known. The whole Mukden district is menaced by large bodies of Chinese troops with artillery. . Chinese troops and Boxers, in defiance of treaties, have appeared at the towns of Tukehou, Sinjudshi and Galeff, in-citing the inhabitants to revolt. On July 17th the garrison at Sinjudshi was

uly 17th the garrison at Sinjudshi was belied from the town, three men being killed. A Russian detachment return-ing from an inspection of affairs in Gaoudun peninsula was attacked and surrounded by Chinese troops on July 21st. The Russians eventually repulsed the Chinese with a loss of eight Cossacks killed and ten wounded.
