"The obsequies of the late Mrs. Catherine C., wife of William Leander, of the 12th Ward, were largely attended yesterday (Wednesday). Elder Orson Pratt delivered an address full of consolation to the bereaved, and instructions and encouragement to all assembled. Elder Geo. C. Cannon was also present, and made the opening prayer. "The deceased was respected and beloved by a large circle of acquaintances, kind and charitable to all, and a most gentle and affectionate wife and mother. She died strong in the faith of the latter-day Saints."

From the South.—To-day we received a call from Elder James A. Little, who has been called to go on a mission to preach the gospel. He arrived in town last Monday, from the Elm of the Basin, about thirty-five miles north of Kanab, near the head of the Sevier. He informs us that cattle and sheep are being crowded into that region of country, the great bend of the Colorado, from the older settlements, where the ranges are poor, owing to the increase of stock and the extreme dryness of the season. The range in these new localities is fair at present, but there is a prospect of its being used up soon by overstocking.

Elder Little will leave on Monday, for the Eastern States, in company with his brother, Elder Fernmore Little, and other missionaries, who purpose leaving the same day.

He further informs us that the settlements in the southern portion of the Territory are really in a more prosperous condition materially than the more northern ones, for the reason that they confine themselves more to their own resources than to outside means.

A Bold Attack.—Just about dusk yesterday evening a youth from the 14th Ward was out with a musket after ducks. When near the slough bridge, opposite First South St., on the west, he fired at three ducks that were flying over. One of them, a large grey one, being struck, either with the novelty of the situation or with some of the shot, came rapidly and helplessly to the ground. It was immediately followed by a large grey eagle, which at once fastened upon the duck with the evident intention of putting it "where it would do the most good." The boy thought he would have something to say about the matter and as there was not much time for a rehearsal of the case, he promptly struck the "bird of freedom" across the back with a club, when he relinquished his club, and feeling somewhat sore, soared off into the blue empyrean.

A Splendid Shower.—The dry spell which has prevailed so long ended yesterday when it afternoon, commenced to rain, continuing all last night, almost unrelentingly till this morning. It has effectually laid the dust and made the atmosphere pleasant and agreeable, and probably more conducive to good health. It still continues cloudy overland.

The Flipper Nuisance.—The other day a gentleman was walking quietly along one of the streets west of East Temple Street, when he suddenly shot up into the air, about eighteen inches from the ground, in a direct line, like the "Perfect Cure," having been suddenly struck with astonishment and with a buckshot, which made him believe he had been perforated with a rifle ball. He turned and saw the author of his discomfort in the shape of a boy, who had shot the missile from a flipper. He took after the youngster, who, however, proved too nimble for him, and after a long and a severe struggle, he gave up the chase. The flipper nuisance still abounds, and does an incalculable amount of mischief; people are struck by missiles thrown by them; they are used in the indiscriminate smashing of the window glass of vacant houses, and are the frequent cause of runaways upon the streets, by mischievous boys striking horses by means of them, and there should be a regulation authorizing the police, regular and special, to confiscate every flipper found in the hands of boys upon the public streets.
