**LOCAL BRIEFS.**

**Sentenced For Gambling.**—J. A. Grimes was brought to the county jail yesterday from Bingham to serve a term of 30 days for gambling. He was sentenced by Justice of the Peace Lee.

**To Rebuild "U."**—State university students propose to rebuild the big "U" on the side hill with whitewashed rocks, as the slacked line with which the present letter was made, is becoming decidedly rusty.

**Dorcas Society Meets.**—The Dorcas society of the Swedish Lutheran church will meet in the church parlors this (Thursday) evening at 6:30. Miss Anna Gustafson will be hostess. All young people are welcome.

**Y. M. C. A. Reception.**—The Y. M. C. A. fall reception will be given next Saturday evening from 7:30 to 10 o'clock, when the entire building will be open for inspection by the public. There will be music and refreshments.

**Charged With Robbery.**—Sheriff Evans of Tooele county, yesterday brought to the county jail in this city Bert Walters, who is wanted at Evans, Wyo., upon a charge of robbery. He will be kept in the jail here until the arrival of the Wyoming officer.

**The Tablet.**—A new educational periodical is to be published from the state university by Principal Jos. E. McKnight of the training school, and will be called the Tablet. It will include a club woman's page, and several general literary matters.

**Tried to Beat Bill.**—Sheriff Emery has arrested George L. Major upon a charge of attempting to beat a board bill of \$60. The complaint was sworn to by L. C. Smith with whom Major has boarded for some time past. Major was preparing to leave the city at the time he was arrested.

**Birthday Celebration.**—The seventy-fifth anniversary of the birth of Bishop Joseph Warburton will be fittingly and appropriately celebrated in the first ward assembly hall on Friday, Sept. 21, at 8 p. m. All members of the first ward and friends of the bishop are cordially invited to attend.

**Building Tramway.**—E. D. Woolley of Kanab is in the city on a business trip. He is engaged in building an aerial tramway across the Grand canyon of the Colorado near Bright Angel creek at the southern end of the Buckskin mountains, and is 50 feet above the water. It is said to be the only way of crossing the river within several hundred miles.

**Cathedral Windows.**—The windows of the new Catholic cathedral will have exterior, or protective glass, and the art glass windows will have four inches space between them. The exterior glass is heavy opaque plate, and most of it is now in place. The art glass now in transit from Munich, Germany, is liable to be here any week. It is of elaborate pattern and rich in coloring.

**Employees Organized.**—The employees of the Utah Light & Railway company, met yesterday, and organized a club for social purposes. It is the intention to put up a room for gymnasium and reading purposes. The following officers were chosen: President, O. P. Arnold, Jr.; vice president, John Jones; treasurer, Alex. **Antidormitory.**—The Salt Lake Auditorium company has filed its articles of incorporation with the county clerk. Its capital stock is \$50,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$10 each. Phil S. O'Mara is president; Richard Barbour, vice president; J. H. Barbour, secretary and treasurer. The company will conduct roller skating rink, dances and other amusement enterprises in Salt Lake and Ogden.

**Filing on Lands.**—Mr. DeMogley reports that nearly 1,700 netters have filed upon lands near Vernal, and more are coming in the spring. There has been some delay in opening and arranging for irrigation ditches and for this reason the water people will spend the winter where horse feed is cheaper. But there is plenty of water to be had, and before long the valley of the Duchesne will be a regular garden. The soil there will yield 70 to 80 bushels of oats to the acre.

**Lecture on Socialism.**—Walter Mills of Chicago lectured on Socialism last night in Federation hall. He said the war between capital and labor is no longer an industrial, but a political war, which must be settled by the ballot. Gompers advocates it in spots. The political power must be universal and felt in all its power and potency everywhere. "I carry a Socialist card," said the speaker, "which makes me a comrade and brother of every Socialist on earth, in numbers over 8,000,000."

**Grover Melville Dead.**—Grover C. Melville of Fillmore county, Utah, died at the L. D. S. hospital yesterday from appendicitis after an illness of several days. He was operated on Monday night, but peritonitis had set in before the operation was performed. He was 38 years of age; a son of Mr. and Mrs. James A. Melville, and a young man of exceptionally good behavior. He has been a diligent student and passed the last teachers' examination and had been engaged to teach school in Summit county. The remains will be shipped to Fillmore and interred in the city cemetery there Saturday.

**Mining Congress Luncheon.**—T. E. Wood of Denver, representing the interests of the American Mining Congress which opens this year's session in Colorado's capital city on Oct. 18, is in the city to confer with local mining men with the view of arousing more local interest in the mining meeting. An informal luncheon was given to Mr. Wood at the Commercial club today which was attended by about 20. The visitor pointed out the importance of this state being well represented at the next gathering and of some of the matters to be discussed looking towards the enactment of laws to promote the welfare of the industry. Several Salt Lake residents responded.

**In Eastern College.**—Edward Troxell of this city, Heber Johnson of Springville and Charles Johnson of Idaho, members of the last sophomore class of Northwestern University, have entered the junior class of Northwestern University, Ill., and Orlando Over of the same class has entered the junior class of the Lutheran college in Iowa.
