

## SHRINKAGE IN BALLOT RETURNS.

Barbidge Drops Behind Thirteen  
In the Fifteenth District Ac-  
cording to Court Count.

WOOD, DEAN AND BADGER ALSO

The Three Named Lose Respectively  
Six, Ten and Seven Votes—Case  
Continued Until Monday.

In the three districts of the Second precinct in which the court has re-counted the ballots in the election contest case, Barbidge has lost 23 votes, Dean 10, Wood 6 and Badger 7. The result, therefore, of Districts 13, 14 and 15 give Dean a majority of two votes over Barbidge, who was declared elected by the city council in its official canvass of the returns.

After the "News" report closed yesterday afternoon of the election judges of District 14, Alexander Buchanan, Jr., and C. A. Carlquist, were examined as to the disposition of the two ballots which were missing. It was found that two of the ballots sent to the judges were blank. They were, therefore, pinned together and laid aside, and it was the intention of the judges to return them with the other ballots but it is supposed that they were misplaced and hence not returned. The count of the ballots in that district was then made which resulted in the following vote: Dean 47, Wood 35, Barbidge 30, Badger 24 and each of the two Socialist candidates 25. It was found that Dean lost 3 votes, Barbidge 7 and Badger 3.

In the Fifteenth district Wood received 146, Dean 107, Barbidge 69, Badger 71 and the Socialist candidates 39 each. It was in this district that there was a mistake of 10 votes discovered by the city council in its canvass, and they were credited to Barbidge. A recount resulted in Barbidge losing those 10 votes and also three more making his loss 13. Dean lost 2, Wood lost 2, Badger lost 1 and each of the two Socialist candidates lost 1. It was in this district that the attorneys objected to a recount of the ballots being made because the bag containing the same was only partially sealed when brought into court from the city recorder's office.

At the conclusion of the count of the ballots in that district the case was continued until 10 o'clock Monday morning.

At the office of the Idaho Sugar company the first check received for sales of sugar were deposited this morning, amounting to \$3,000. A dispatch from the factory today states that 632 tons of beets were sliced during the last 24 hours, 33 tons above the guaranteed capacity. The official notice of the payment of a dividend on Utah preferred is out, and states that the disbursement will take place on the 21st, the stock books closing on the 21st. The second call of 10 per cent on the stock of the Fremont County Sugar company has been made for Jan. 2nd.

Up to this time merchants report that the general holiday trade is somewhat below that of last year.
