



Representative Burton L. French Issues a Document Reviewing Past History.

POLITICS SIMMER IN IDAHO.

Congressman Calls Attention to Some Statements Made Prior to the Recent Change of Front.

Congressman Burton L. French of Idaho has issued an open letter addressed to Former U. S. Senator Fred T. Dubois wherein he reviews some past history. The letter has been printed in pamphlet form and mailed to the press. The letter is as follows:

ARMY PAY MEASURE SECURES FINAL PASSAGE

Washington, March 6.—The army bay bill was passed by the senate to-lay. The bill provides for army officers a graded increase of pay ranging from per cent for lieutenant-generals to 20 5 per cent for inentenant-generals to 25 per cent for junior officers. It also pro-vides that "the average pay of enlisted men of the army as now established be increased 40 per cent." This amendment suggested by Mr. Culbertson of Texas, takes away the discretion of the president in fixing the pay of soldiers.

MAY PARDON STOESSEL.

St. Petersburg, March 6.—The ver-dict in the case of Lieut. Gen. Stoessel, who was recently sentenced to death by a court martial for the surrender of the Port Arthur fortress to the Japanes was formally pronounced today. It is regarded as almost certain, however, that Emperor Nicholas will accept the recommendation of the court that the sentence be commuted. The court has annulled the sentence of reprimand passed upon Lieut, Gen. Fock because of the remoteness of his offense.
