Governor Cutler and Atty.-Gen. Breeden Decide on a Number Of Improvements.

DR. HINTON LAID TO REST.

The visit of the state officials was made at the request of the school management, who a few days ago visited the governor and other prominent state officers for the purose of securing an appropriation for the buying of new furniture, carpets, the buying of new furniture, carpets, linoleum, and other necessary improve-ments at the institution. Governor Cutier and Major Breeden were much pleased with the school and the pro-gress it is making. The pupils at the school appear to be more industrious and are doing well in the trades de-cortinents also in their schoolastic partments, also in their schoolastic studies. The gentlemen were satis-fied that the furniture, etc., asked for by the board are absolutely necessary, as the present furnishings are badly vorn, especially the carpets and lino lium, and the management was as-sured that it would receive as large an appropriation as can possibly be made at the present time for these Improvements. In inspecting the buildings the visiting gentlemen noted the lack of light in some of the apartments, and that matter was also dis-cussed. It was decided to put in several extra windows, so that more light can be had, a number of other small improvements are also to be consman improvements are also to be con-sidered.
