

GOV. HASKELL TO PREST. ROOSEVELT

With Effrontery Charges Chief
Executive Would Fix a Court
Or Pack a Jury.

ENTIRE LETTER INSULTING.

Challenges Him to Publish Records in
Oil Franchise and Intimates He
Would Garble Them.

Guthrie, Okla., Sept. 30.—Gov. Charles N. Haskell has written a letter to President Roosevelt, in which he says: "I lay aside my appeal for justice to you for the reason that I am convinced that no matter how dignified, great and honorable the office of president may be, the present clearly demonstrates the fact that the occupant of that office may be without fairness, justice or integrity."

CHARGES AGAINST PRESIDENT.

"You have clearly demonstrated by hearsay, dodging and vacillating from one charge to another, by admitting that you are not a lawyer, by withdrawing your charges without foundation, and yet without displaying the manhood to apologize for former untruthful statements, you seek another trial. It leads me to assert that I shall seek justice against you before the people and in a court not subject to your domination. Frankly speaking, I could not arrive at any other conclusion than that you, in your reckless partisanship and disregard of the rights of others, would fix a court or pack a jury. I am ready to meet it and before the conclusion of the trial, I shall be disgusted that the people of America are president of the United States."

"Mr. Roosevelt, I have said that you were responsible for the granting of the franchise to the Standard Oil and Gas company before statehood, thereby creating vested rights in that company that our state authority is powerless to interrupt. You have tried in your last statement to evade this charge. You have tried to give your readers a wrong impression. In the office of the interior department the records will speak for themselves. I say that you granted that franchise, and that you did it at the solicitation of Senator Depew and others, and that within a few days thereafter, chiefly by subscription of Standard Oil men, according to Mr. Harpman, the sum of \$250,000 in cash was added to your campaign fund."

PUBLISH THE RECORDS.

"I challenge you to publish the records of the interior department on the subject of this franchise. Mark me now, Mr. Roosevelt, you must not garble the records, nor suppress any of them. The public shall know the truth. It may have been sufficient four years ago for you to wipe out the truthful statement made by Judge Parker by simply calling him a liar, but that was four years ago, and your controversy now is with a man who will not accept a bluff in exchange for a receipt in full payment. In any character, Mr. Harpman, you make that I have at any time during my entire life had any connection whatever or of any character with the Standard Oil company or any of its subsidiaries. I am ready to refute such statement."

"It is still fresh in the minds of the people of our state, labor unions, farmers' unions and other advocates of honest and humane government that the 12 objections you raised to our constitution struck at the very vitals of honest government. Your threat to turn down our constitution because it contained provisions for jury trial in contempt cases is only one of the many things that you criticized, and I think God to this day that I had the courage to challenge you at that time to turn our constitution down on that ground if you dared to do so. You said that your opinion of our constitution would not look well in print. Mr. Harpman and J. P. Morgan said the same thing, but Samuel Gompers said the constitution of Oklahoma was the best ever written. I expected you to agree with Mr. Morgan and Mr. Harpman, and, of course, was not surprised."

MAKES NO COMPARISONS.

"Morally, Mr. Roosevelt, I should not undertake to make a comparison between you and me. I do not get drunk on any occasion and never did in my life, but still have your letter of last winter, which I shall be glad to publish with your permission, advocating your idea of interstate commerce of whiskey in prohibition territory. answer to my appeal for assistance and would freeze the heart of any honest public official seeking to administer the laws of his state as the people by their votes had made the law.

"Mr. Roosevelt, let us not leave this Standard Oil company question directly inviting from you information that we really need. You made a ruling that 4,800 acres of land was the limit that any person or corporation directly or indirectly could obtain under lease for oil purposes in the Indian Territory, and renewed the lease on 630,000 acres of Osage land to the Indian Territory Illuminating Oil company, and you know that the agent for the Standard Oil company owned a majority of the stock of that corporation and gave them a monopoly on the Osage oil lands."

"Again, Mr. Barandale, the well-known representative of the Standard Oil company, has leases, as I am advised by Mr. Shea of Bartlesville, on a little over 100,000 acres of Indian allotments in the Indian Territory, and I am advised on the account of the controversy brought to your personal attention that you know of these excessive landholdings. Why did you do this?"

CASE OF PAUL MORTON.
"You criticize my directing the dismissal of the suit against the Standard Oil and Gas company, which could not have been successfully maintained by the state. Tell me, please, what your reason was for directing the dismissal of any suit against the Standard Oil and Gas company, being prosecuted by Judson Harmon and special counsel, when the facts disclosed that a member of your cabinet (Paul Morton) was being uncovered as the prime offender. Answer this, will you?"

"Mr. Roosevelt, you cry out for purity. You say you would not do anything to know where the corporation fund was coming from to secure your election until the testimony of two years ago was disclosed. You have known that fact for two years, and Mr. Cortelyou is still one of your cabinet members."

"Now, Mr. Roosevelt, while you are reflecting on these questions, will you justify yourself in giving faith or credit to any statement that comes to you from your political associate, Mr. Hearst, whom two years ago you branded as the man chiefly responsible for the assassination of our late president?"

Remember, Mr. President, if at your next cabinet meeting you direct that I speak as your cabinet member, before your cabinet sitting as a jury to try an honest man, that I challenge Mr. Cortelyou for cause.

CREEK INDIAN LANDS.

"You said in your first statement that I had suits brought against me to recover title to Creek Indian lands. Overwhelmed you on that statement. Adopting your usual policy, you flee from that statement without just apology and adopt the statement that I am a liar. I say that I have brought against many different honorable and high-minded citizens of this state during the presidential campaign, and you will not undertake to deny that petty politics, for the purpose of Republicanizing about 30,000 Indian voters, was your sole motive for having suits brought against them. I charge you with knowing that there has been no delay in these cases, except that occasioned by the court's deliberations taken by himself as much time as he deemed necessary to determine whether or not there is merit in the petition filed by your attorney."

"You say that on the land question you will see that I get a hearing in court. Yes, sir, I welcome your hearing. Call to your assistance all the power that your high office commands. Present your case in any form you like."

BRYAN'S HOME COMING WEEK

Concludes a Speechmaking Tour
Of More Than Three
Weeks in Iowa.

STILL AFTER JUDGE TAFT.

Asks What Ideas of His (Taft's) Own
Have Been Put Into Practice
With Success.

Creston, Ia., Sept. 30.—Traversing the southeastern and southern portions of Iowa all day in an ordinary coach, William J. Bryan concluded his whirlwind speechmaking tour of more than three weeks at this place tonight, where a big open air meeting was held. No greater demonstrations have been accorded anywhere than in Iowa. When he took a late train for Lincoln Mr. Bryan had delivered during the day 15 speeches to immense crowds, a great number of whom were farmers, who manifested the greatest interest.

A ROUSING RECEPTION.

Knockville, Ia., Sept. 30.—Upon his arrival here today, W. J. Bryan received a rousing reception. It being home-coming week, a large crowd was on hand to greet him. He was welcomed with a special cowboy escort, headed by a band, and was driven through the streets to the hotel, amid deafening cheers. Speeches delivered from the court house steps, was devoted mainly to a castigation of Mr. Taft, whom he charged with having borrowed ideas from him. "I can say that I have had a part in his education. I have helped to convert him from the error of his ways; helped to lead him out into the light on several questions."

MR. BRYAN'S SPEECH.

In part, Mr. Bryan spoke as follows: "Mr. Taft says that I have borrowed anything but talk, while he has been putting his ideas into practice in an administrative way. While it is true that he has held office more than I have, and therefore has had more opportunity to put ideas into practice, I have had more opportunity to see my ideas borrowed than he has had. 'What idea of his own has been put into practice with success? He was a judge upon the bench. Was the insubordination of the laboring man, or anybody else? He put it into practice, but he put it into practice in such a way that he has alienated the wage-earners of the country. He has introduced colonialism into practice. Was that his idea?"

"No, he got it from Europe, and imitated in the Philippines what Great Britain did in this country. He has put his own ideas into practice in an administrative way. Now let me show what ideas he borrowed. He has abandoned the idea of a permanent colonial system and advocates ultimate independence of the Philippines. Where did he get that idea? It is not original with him. He did not get it from the Republicans, for they have never put it in their platforms. Where did he get it? He got it from the Democratic platform, and I have had as much to do with the presentation of the idea as do the Republicans. He says he is in favor of an income tax. Where did he get the idea? It is not his own. It was in the Democratic platform of 1896. It is in his platform. He cannot claim originally the presentation of this idea. I have spoken on the subject earlier than he has, and offered more than he has. He is personally inclined to favor the election of senators by the direct vote of the people. 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
