MURDEROUS WORK.
DETERMINED AND REPEATED ATTEMPTS TO WRECK TRAINS ON THE UNION PACIFIC R. R.

The following statement is taken from the Laramie *Boomerang* of the 11th inst.:

One of the boldest and most fendish efforts made to wreck a train was unsuccessfully tried on the hill today, at an isolated spot between Sherman and Laramie, on the Union Pacific.

The passenger train No. 2, did not leave Laramie until 11:30, over four hours late, and pulled out in two sections, the first being the California time freight and the second being an unusually heavy load of coaches; the engine was a 4-6-0.

From Sherman to Buford the descent is very sharp and as the trains were late in starting they were running at a very lively rate. It was right here that the engineer of the first section mist took sign of an obstruction

on the track. It was too late to stop and it was run into and knocked off, forcing the train to ditch. The rails, though it was a heavy railroad the laid right across the rails at the most dangerous point.

Fifteen minutes later the second section came sweeping down like the wind and the train was again in the air and there was a big crash and again it was knocked off by the pilot and a wreck avoided. Such an attempt twice made at midday has caused no little excitement among the train men here. It is evident that some villain's work is in progress, whether for the purpose of robbing the killed and wounded, or from revenge, or pure cussedness, is not known. The railroad men are now watching kept for such obstructions hereafter.

When "Hamlet" was revived at the Queen's theatre on August 17, when Mr. Abington in the title part, the appearances of the ghost on the battlements and in the Queen's chamber were made behind some cleverly worked transparent scenery, the two beings so well confused by means of a powerful light that the shade of Hamlet's father actually acquired the semblance of being seen through. In Charles Duffass's "Hamlet," the ghost was

 vation pretends itself, but in the
 scene where Hamlet learns the secret
 of his father's death, the imposture
 of the setting of Mr. Haver's credulity
 gave precedence to the shade and readily
 lent itself to a surprising exit. This
 was about all that could be done
 one of the most conventional roles or
 of the boards. Strange to say, how-
 ever, the never-ending bewailings
 of the play, the ghost still mourns
 on in that "pale, solemn and under-
 standing" manner, and in the same
 way with that "endless tread, and
 measured gait" composed of air, which
 are attributes of the "ghostly" and
 prime characteristics of Arthur Booth
