

city of Frankfort, to which the King will add a million from his private purse, in the hope that such action will draw the hearts of the inhabitants of that city closer to the monarchy.

Havana, 28.—Rumors are in circulation to-day, that an expedition from the United States' shores, had landed near Remedios Guedrillos. Some Cubans declare their belief that as soon as Grant is inaugurated he will recognize the belligerent rights of the revolutionists' government.

Mr. Hall, United States consul at Matanzas, will assume the function of consul at Havana.

The emigration of the Cubans is undiminished. Every steamer leaves the port crowded. More troops are needed from Spain to occupy the whole island, and disperse the insurgents; the troops are now unable to do more than hold their own. In the meantime the people in the country suffer all kinds of destitution; their complaints are heart rending, and thousands are seeking refuge in the cities.

Havana, 1.—Pueblo has arrived from Cienfuegos and will take command at Santo Esperito. The *Diario* reports an engagement with the troops and insurgents at Cienfuegos, in which the troops were victorious. It states that three hundred rebels surrendered at Villa Clara. It seems that Lucca is advancing into the interior without opposition. The rebels, it is supposed, have had to take the road to Paradez, where they had occupied entrenchments and were prepared to oppose, but they took another route being outwitted.

Quesada.—The *Diario* asserts that the revolutionary General Arengo has abandoned the rebellion, and joined Valmaseda with two thousand men. Valmaseda reinforced, with a thousand of these, had started to meet Lezca, and with the combined force, to attack Quesada. Four Spanish gunboats, cruising between Guajay and Guadina, were watching the movements of Gbra, and a Spanish man of war at of the rebels in the waters of Nassau.

Paris.—Lamartine died to-day, aged 79 years.

New York.—Alaska advices of Feb. say that two white men, while on a trading expedition, were killed by the Kaike Indians, near Sitka, in revenge for the death of their friends shot by the sentries at Sitka. The U. S. steamer *Saginaw*, with Gen. Davis and staff, was about to leave for Kaike. The revenue cutter *Reliance* is still at Sitka.

London.—A report is current that the present Spanish Minister to England has received instructions from Madrid to proceed to Washington to settle any difficulties which may arise in consequence of the Cuban insurrection.

Madrid.—The insurrection attempted at Barcelona, last week, was quickly suppressed; forty persons were implicated. The city is tranquil.

New York, 3.—A St. Petersburg letter says the Czar's health is doubtful; there is but little improvement. Since his travel last summer he has been steadily failing.

Havana.—The reports of a rising at Consolacion are confirmed. Troops have been sent to quell another rising at Calez, near Matanzas.

A steamer recently arrived at Santiago with a cargo of coolies and negroes, but they were prevented from landing. The troops are barricading and fortifying Santa Espiritu. The *Preusia* says Dulce has ordered 150 volunteers to take the prisoners captured to Spain.

San Francisco, 3.—Australian dates by sail say the reply of the Sydney Chamber of Commerce to the Melbourne Chamber for a Custom's Union, was not considered conclusive, and that further steps will be taken. Preparations for the Northern Territory expedition were proceeding rapidly. Recruits were offering themselves freely for the New Zealand service. The excitement over the recent massacre is intense. The war is being conducted vigorously. Fifty-seven of the enemy were killed by friendly Maories in the recent battle. It is stated that there is good reason to believe that the letters supposed to have been written by King, advising and appointing a rising of the tribes are not authentic.

Mauritius advices confirm the reported deficiency of the sugar crop.

Berlin.—A document has appeared, signed by the Ex-King of Hanover, protesting against the confiscation of his property by the Prussian Government.

Madrid.—Seven leaders of the Carlist movement have been arrested in Aragon. A quantity of arms and ammunition, which had been concealed by them, was discovered and seized; important papers and correspondence also fell into the hands of the Government.
