Havana, 28.-Rumors are in circulation to-day, that an expedition from the United States' shores, had landed near Remedos Gueedrillos. Some Cubans declare their belief that as soon as Grant is inaugurated he will recognize the belligerent rights of the revolutionists' government.

Mr. Hall, United States consul at Matanzas, will assume the function of consul at Havana.

The emigration of the Cubans is undiminished. Every steamer leaves the port crowded. More troops are needed from Spain to occupy the whole island, and disperse the insurgents; the troops are now unable to do more than hold Bateson J their own. In the meantime the people in the country suffer all kinds of destitution; their complaints are heart rending, and thousands are seeking refuge in the cities.


