

SENATOR STONE TELLS OF KOREA

Says Japanese Are Ruling With Mailed Fist—Situation Is Pathetic.

SEES ABSOLUTE DESPOTISM.

Emperor and Father Are Strangers in Their Own Palaces—Might, Not Right.

Seoul, Korea, Aug. 14.—Senator William J. Stone of Missouri, who spent a week investigating the Korean situation, was received in audience today by the emperor and the retired emperor under Marquis Ito, the chaperone. Senator Stone, in summoning up the situation, said:

"From a Korean standpoint the situation is pathetic. For the first time in my life I have seen the mailed hand of a foreign power raised ruthlessly over a conquered people. One emperor has been forced to abdicate, to make place for a weakling. Both are held in practical imprisonment by their conquerors. There is an armed Japanese force about the palace, and Koreans are denied the right of access or communication with the palace—only the bidding of Marquis Ito, and who dare not show themselves in the streets of Seoul without a Japanese military guard.

RULED BY SAVAGE.
"No man, Korean or foreigner, can have an audience with the emperor except by permission and in the presence of Marquis Ito. The emperor and his father are prisoners in their own palace and the marquis is the real ruler. The government is a despotism of foreigners upheld by a military force. The people of Korea are overawed, intimidated and subdued, and well they may be, for he who rules them is as ruthless and as arbitrary as a savage, and is supreme.

AMERICA POWERLESS.
"It is pitiful to note the helplessness and helplessness of this unhappy people. No American could witness this national tragedy without a feeling of profound pity for the victims, but, unhappily, in view of the Philippines, the American protest is measurably silenced, from an international standpoint.

THE JAPANESE IDEA.
"The purpose of the Japanese is to appropriate Korea and make it a gateway for encroachment upon China. The Japanese policy of Japan is one of territorial and commercial aggrandizement, and this policy Japan is carrying forward with a ruthless unexampled in modern times. Right is based on might, and the world looks on indifferently. But history is surely being made here which in its ultimate and intended consequences reaches far beyond the confines of this country and involves far more than the destiny of this unhappy empire. Some day there will be, there must be, a reckoning."

VETERANS SEE HOT CONTEST COMING.

Kansas City, Aug. 14.—The time of the delegates to the annual reunion of the Army of the Philippines today was taken up with business matters. The delegates late in the day will consider the report of Gen. Greene, favoring the holding of the next gathering in Manila. The election will take place tomorrow. There is a hot fight on for the office of commander-in-chief. The leading candidates are Gen. J. Frank Bell, who is in the lead; Gen. S. M. B. Young and Harrison Gray Otis of Los Angeles.

COULDN'T REACH HIM QUITE SOON ENOUGH.

Santa Ana, Cal., Aug. 14.—Albert Goodyear, manager of the Hotel Del Mar at Carona Del Mar, above Newberry, was drowned at the entrance of the bay this morning while bathing. Two fishermen heard his call for help, but could not reach him in time. Goodyear came from Milwaukee four weeks ago. The body has not been recovered.

ANXIOUS TO CLEAN NEW MEXICO MESS.

Oyster Bay, Aug. 14.—Pres. Roosevelt entertained at luncheon today McHarg, assistant United States attorney, who has been conducting the federal investigation in New Mexico. After discussing these investigations with the president, McHarg said Roosevelt was very anxious to have them continue, and that his confidence in Curry, the new governor, is such that he believes the federal territorial office will work together in straightening out New Mexico's tangled affairs. Besides the suits already begun, McHarg expects to begin several against companies which, it is alleged, illegally obtained lands and timber.

A Gazette man and stated that he would undoubtedly file the complaint next week, and that in his opinion the interstate commerce commission would take immediate action to relieve the present conditions in regard to the N. C. O. railway.

The complaint is entitled Nevada Commercial league vs. Nevada-California-Oregon railway and Sierra Valley railway, a petition and complaint to the interstate commerce commission. Article one of this complaint alleges that the N. C. O. and Sierra Valley railways are at present discriminating against Reno shippers by unjust tariffs, and that the people of Reno should have relief.

It asks that the interstate commerce commission take action and force the N. C. O. to grant the shippers of Reno a just rate.

The complaint first alleges that the N. C. O. and Sierra Valley railways have heretofore charged an unjust rate in accordance with its tariff entitled "Local Distance Freight Tariff No. 2," and that it has recently published a new tariff effective Aug. 15, 1907, entitled "Local Distance Freight Tariff No. 3," which is an increase of 10 per cent over the old tariff.

Among other things the complaint declares that although the N. C. O. company has increased its rates, it last year made a profit of nearly 30 per cent on the capital stock after paying 6 per cent on its bonds.

It is also alleged in the complaint that the company has used unjust and numerous other shippers of this city, and that it has made the rate prohibitive on the goods of two of the complainants.

Mr. Brice will have the complaint finished by Tuesday and will then file it with the interstate commerce commission so that immediate relief may be obtained.

ASK PRESIDENT FOR ASSISTANCE

Urged to Try to Bring About Settlement in Telegraphy Deadlock.

HIS ACTION IS DOUBTFUL.

Com. Neill Has Made No Appeal to Nation's Chief and Has Received No Messages.

Kansas City, Mo., Aug. 14.—The board of trade this afternoon ordered the following message sent to Pres. Roosevelt at Oyster Bay:

"The deadlock between the telegraphers and their employers is a national calamity, demanding an immediate settlement of the differences at issue. In this emergency we must respectfully urge you to use your best endeavors to bring about a settlement.

(Signed) "THOMAS J. BROADNAX, 'President.'"

Oyster Bay, Aug. 14.—Pres. Roosevelt will not concern himself personally with the telegraphers' strike, according to the best information obtainable here tonight.

Appeals to the president to take some action looking to a settlement of the strike were received at the executive office here today from boards of trade and commercial bodies of a large number of cities. The applications were similar in character to those formulated yesterday by the Chicago board of trade. Each emphasized the importance of the direct action by the president. The communications have been referred to Commissioner of Labor Charles F. Neill. It is understood that no instructions or recommendations have followed to Mr. Neill. From the first Mr. Neill has been active in an endeavor to effect a settlement of the trouble. It is stated here that he has as yet made no report to the president, nor has he received messages from Mr. Roosevelt touching upon the matter. Mr. Neill's movements, however, have been closely followed, and while the direct statement is not made, the impression is given that Mr. Neill's efforts to effect a settlement are being actively considered.

GRIEF OVER LOST PUP STRIKES DEATH BLOW.

Cleveland, O., Aug. 12.—Grief over the loss of his employer's bull pup caused the death of Charles Powell, colored, who died at Cleveland general hospital yesterday morning. The lost pup was found but not until it had been too late to save Powell's life. He died without knowing that the dog had been recovered.

For the past 18 years Powell had been employed as a coachman by Dr. W. H. Kitchen, president of the State Banking & Trust company of 3134 Euclid avenue. He was a faithful and took great pride in the doctor's horses and dogs. He was especially attached to Punk, a bull pup.

When the dog wandered away from the house last Tuesday Powell was most distracted over his loss. He set out in search for the dog and for several hours walked the hot streets in a vain endeavor to locate the animal. He was greatly worried and the dog, which was a pointer, was left-stricken, over the pup's loss, and when he returned at nightfall, he collapsed in his employer's kitchen.

Powell was taken to Cleveland general hospital, where he died between two life and death until the end came yesterday morning. He was unconscious the greater part of the time, but during his lucid moments he called for Punk and begged to be allowed to continue the search.

Paris, Aug.—A union of the cripples of France is the latest society which has asked the police authorities the honor of registration on their books. The movement was started by a Marseilles cripple named Robin, who gained his living with a street organ. He came to the conclusion that the genuine cripples who lived on the sympathy of the public were being greatly damaged by charlatans and false cripples. As a first step he formed a local society at Marseilles, but the movement has now spread to Paris, and here a well-known violin organ grinder, Pousineau, is arranging to establish a cripples' union. His Marseilles colleague is coming to Paris to confer with him, but as his means are limited he is coming on foot, and is taking advantage of his journey to bid for the adherence of the cripples in all the towns and villages he passes through.

It will be some time before Robin arrives, and meanwhile Pousineau is working very hard at the federation scheme. M. Pousineau lost both his legs by a level crossing accident.

REPUBLICANS SCORE VICTORY

San Francisco's City Election Results in Triumph for Decent Element.

San Francisco, Aug. 14.—The primary election in this city resulted in a sweeping victory for the Republican or Ryan ticket, which stood for earnest support of the bribery graft prosecution and the present mayor and board of supervisors. The opposing faction, led by Postmaster Flske, made a sorry showing, electing not more than 19 delegates to the party convention, which will consist of 149 members. The result was a notable triumph for the reform element.

The regular Democratic or McNabbe ticket was victorious and will control the nominating convention by a large majority.

WHAT VICTORY MEANS.

The representatives of the better element of the Union Labor party cast a majority of their votes in favor of Mr. Carthy and the Schmitz organ. The element opposed to the bribery graft prosecution will control the labor convention, but whether or not ex-Mayor Schmitz' friends will go so far as to renounce him is problematical.

The victory of the Ryan Republicans means but one thing—political support of the bribery graft prosecution and in all likelihood the renomination of District Atty. Langdon, who, it is privately understood, will be backed by McNabbe also.

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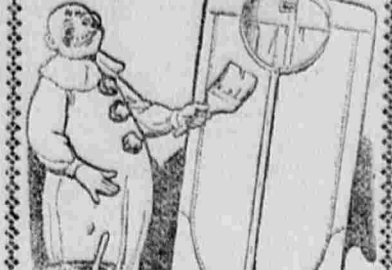
