The memory of the popular King Charles XV. was celebrated May 23 with a banquet at Christiansia.

Sweden has commenced to export iron and lumber to Denmark in Africa.

Buddh Wall, the newspaper "Beopst" of Sweden, has given up its position as publisher and editor of the "Daily News" publishing company.

Chief von Krusenstern, who owned valuable real estate in Iceland, died recently on account of the typhoid fever of his daughter, Emma, and with his wife, who has been a country seat near Kilauea.

The keeper of the edifice "Hilf Pig" in Iceland, Norway, has bought several hundred copies of the "War Cry," the newspaper of Salvation Army.

Queen wedding was celebrated lately by the farmer, Simon Gleditsch and his wife, Olga, Orskov.

The first man employed by the Coast of Norway, the vice of the Refshale, Vestmanna, are on a strike.

Seven hundred and seventy-four emigrants, of whom thirty-three were women, emigrated to America May 1, by way of Copenhagen.

Nine thousand five hundred and thirty persons have emigrated to America by way of Copenhagen during the first three months of this year, as compared with 8227 during the same time in 1890.

KILLED BY SOLDIERS WHILE STRUGGLING FOR FOOD.

London, June 4.—The Telegraph's London correspondent gives a pitiable account of the destitution prevailing in the city of Moscow.

The correspondent says hundreds of persons have died in the past few weeks. Famine in the streets and the districts have reached a point where the soldiers are ordered to shoot any person who is seen to be suffering from the want of food.
