NEW EQUIPMENT INSTALLED

**Among the Machinery Added is an
Air Compressor—Ready for Opera-
tion on Next Monday.**

Capt. Duncan McVieche, manager of the Birmingham Co., yesterday visited the Eagle & Blue Bell mine of Tintic, the control of which was recently taken over by his company.

The captain said this morning that conditions are being shaped up for a very vigorous campaign at that property. It has been necessary to install new equipment, powerful than that in use prior to the change in management, and by not later than next Monday he expects that it will be all in place and ready for business.

At the same time, the new machinery added was an air compressor.

Capt. McVieche is thoroughly confident that new and extensive ore bodies will be opened up in this Tintic property.
