New York, April 2.—Said to have been the first refiner of sugar in the United States, Herman Schroeder, a native of Germany, retired for 30 years after a successful business career in this city, is dead at his home here, aged 88 years. When a young man he came from Germany and in com-pany with several youthful countrymen, opened a small shop where the part-ners began to refine sugar at which trade they worked in Germany. This was the beginning of the sugar refin-ing industry in America.
