BE NO DEPARTURE FROM IT.

German Cruiser Visits Completes

covering a Good Harbor.New York, May 1.—A special to the
Herald says Venezuela will be given to
understand that the United States has
formally approved the course pursued
by Minister Loomis in his action
upon various matters in dispute be-
tween the two governments.At the same time she will be told
that the United States relies upon her
sense of justice in the settlement of
these matters. Instructions setting
forth the attitude of the administration
have been sent by the state department
to Mr. Russell, chargé d'affaires in
Caracas. Mr. Russell will immediately
call upon the Venezuelan minister
for foreign affairs and apprise him of
the fact that the policy of the United
States in the several questions pending
is the same as it was before the with-
drawal of Minister Loomis.Diplomatic representations are con-
sidered simple at this time, especially
in view of the action of the Venezuelan
government in expressing regret to
Mr. Russell for the arrest of Ignacio
H. Barrios, the Venezuelan minister
in Caracas, in the opinion of the
state department, the relations be-
tween the two governments are not

Kier Hardie Says House is Regarded
as an Annex to Stock Exchange.London, May 1.—In the house of
commons John Burns and J. Kier
Hardie, labor leaders, were called to
order by the speaker, the former for
stigmatising Mr. McCarty, M. P., as an
"ornamental guinea pig" because he
had accepted the directorship of the
London and Northwestern Railroad com-
pany after having been appointed

SO DECLARES DR. MORRISON.

Only Armed Chinese Are Robbers and
Boxers—Restoration of Territorial
Jurisdiction is a Paramount Need.London, May 1.—Dr. Morrison, writ-
ing to the Times from Peking April 29,
protests that Count von Waldersee's
policy of punitive expeditions has
"thrown the greater part of the prov-
ince of Chi Li into anarchy and disor-
der.""This is so complete," he says, "that
the neighborhood of Peking is more un-
safe for foreigners than at any pre-
vious time since the occupation began.
The trade with the interior is crippled.
The only armed Chinese are robbers and
Boxers. Restoration to the Chinese
of territorial jurisdiction has become a
paramount need."The correspondent mentions incidentally
that neither the British legation nor
Gen. Gaselee was notified of the ex-
pedition into Shan Si.

VON WALTERSEE'S REPLY.

Peking, May 1.—Gen. Voron, com-
mander of the French forces, is about
leaving Peking for Tien Tsin. He will
make his headquarters there and super-
vise the reduction of the French
troops, who will be gradually withdrawn
in accordance with the wishes of the
ministers of the powers who desire that
a partial reduction of the French
troops should be begun immediately.Today Count von Waldersee sent a
reply to the views of the ministers re-
garding the ministerial question dis-
cussed yesterday by the generals in
conference. The reply agrees in the
main with the suggestions submitted by
the ministers, and names 300 as the
number of troops by which each of the
powers shall be represented in the gar-
risons at Tien Tsin and Shan Hai
Kwan. At their meeting tomorrow the
ministers will receive the report of the
special commission that has been in-
vestigating Chinese finances.

INSURGENTS
SURRENDER.Gen. Tinio and Others Have Given
Up the Fight.

MEANS PEACE IN ISLANDS.

There Remains Now in the Field in
Luzon Only the Notorious Head-
Hunters, Gen. Calles.Washington, April 30.—Gen. Tinio,
with his entire command, has surren-
dered to Capt. Frederick V. Krug of the
Twentieth Infantry at Sinait, province
of South Ilocos. Padre Agapay, the ex-
communicated Filipino priest who
preached the doctrine of a holy war
against the United States, has also
surrendered. Fifteen Filipino officers
have surrendered to Col. Baldwin at
Cavite Viejo. The surrender of Gen.
Alejandrino is confirmed. He was
looked upon as the possible successor
of Aguinaldo.This important information was re-
ceived today at the war department
from Gen. MacArthur at Manila. In
the opinion of the officials, the news
contained in them marks the almost
complete collapse of organized rebellion
in the Philippines. The cablegrams are
as follows:"Gen. Tinio surrendered with his com-
mand today at Sinait. He will deliver
all men and arms in his command as
soon as they can be gathered together.
This completely pacifies the first de-
partment, northern Luzon, for many
months the worst in Luzon.""Cala, Capiatan, Palina and Gregorio
Katibao, Malaya's best officers, surren-
dered to Col. Kline at Lipa on April
28th, with twenty-three officers, 108 men
and eighty-six rifles.""Tinio is said here to have been with
Alejandrino, one of the highest officers
in the insurrectionary forces. He was
in command in northern Luzon during
the famous chase after Commander
Glimore.""Juan and Blas Villamor, leaders in
Abra, surrendered at Bangued, April
27th; now engaged assembling scattered
commands; delivered arms, Aglipay,
ex-priest, leader of the Norte province,
surrendered at Laoca, April
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
