SENSATION IN CARACAS.

Prest. Castro Orders Arrest of Editor Vicente Mijares.

Willemstad, Curacoa, Saturday, April 20 .- (Correspondence of the Associated Press) .- Dr. Vicente Mijares, the edltor of the Republica, a Venezuelan organ, which was earnestly defending the New York and Bermudese company, has been arrested at Caracas by order of President Castro. This arrest has caused a sensation in Caracas, where Dr. Mijares is held in the highest es-

The new Venezuelan constitution came into force April 19. At present the republic is tranquil, but the government officials evidently fear trouble as they continue unremittingly to purchase arms. A German ship, which passed here a few days ago on her way to Venezuela, had 10,000 Mauser rifles, and two million cartridges on board. Gen, Andrade, the former president of Venezuela, is here with Gen. Riera. A complication with Colombia is very much feared, as President Castro lends all the encouragement he can to the Co. lombian revolutionary party.

Question of Wrecking Rights.

Washington, May 1 .- The state department has referred to the British embassy here the complaint made by Moran Bros, of Seattle, against the British Colombian authorities on account of the arrest of the wreckers on board of the Ajax, who were engaged in salving the steamer Williamette, grounded in Union Bay, B. C. The question at issue will be the construc-tion of the word "contiguous" in the agreement between the United States and the Dominion government, which permits citizens of either country to conduct wrecking operations in con-tiguous waters, and it will remain to be whether Union Bay is actually seen contiguous to the American boundary

Tacoma, Wash., May 1 .- Mortimer Montpetit has returned to Walla Walla from his former home in Ohio to find that he was buried some time ago, after being fatally burned in a fire These alleged facts are matters of record in the office of the county audi-tor at Walla Walla. 




