## TAX OF SEVEN MILLS.

Holders of City Property Must Pay for This Year.

## EIGHT MILLS WAS DEFEATED:

Committee to Tax for Education Tax passed, Majority and minority 32,000,000 to 31,400.

A special notice of the City Council was read last night in accordance with the following letter from Mayor Gladding:

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, July 6, 1896.  
To the Honorable City Council:  
Gentlemen: I have called together in session, recently this evening, the members of the various committees on taxation, and after a long discussion of the subject, it was voted to oppose the tax of eight mills, and to support the tax of seven mills.

The resolution requires that this be done on or before the first Monday in July in this year, and I do not know if the majority of members will be present to vote, and if not, the question will be left open.

A boy drowned.

It was then shown that he had been earning money in social places, though his children were dependent.
