Telegraph Decision. TOPEKA, 31.-In the United States Circuit Court to-day, Judge Mc Crary rendered his opinion in the case of the Western Union Telegraph Company vs. the St. Joseph and Denver City Railroad. The American Union Telegraph Company and others, affecting the telegraph and others, affecting the telegraph graph line on that railroad from St. Joseph to Hastings, Nebraska, This was one of the Western Union Telegraph lines seized by force by the Gould radircad during the night of February 26th last. Judge McCrary holds that it is not necessary to determine whether the railroad charter expired in 1877 or not, or whether the contract with the Western Union Telegraph Company is void or not, because in so far as the contract has been executed the parties are bound. On the question of the effect of the foreclosure proceedings Judge McCrary holds that the ratification of the contract and use of the line under it find the successors the same as the original railroad company.
