COMPLETE ANARCHY REIGNS IN ODESSA

During the Night Hundreds of
Rioters Were Shot and Killed
By the Troops.

MARTIAL LAW PROCLAIMED.

Streets Filled With Thousands of
Frenzied Workmen Fighting
The Soldiers.

MUTINEERS AND MACHINE GUNS.

Landed from the Knaiz Potemkin
And Fought Behind Baricades With
Strikers Against the Military.

Odessa, June 29.—Hundreds of rioters were shot and many killed by troops during the night. Martial law has been proclaimed. Fires were still burning at midnight, but there was a lull in the disorders at that time.

Practically the entire harbor was gutted by the fires started by the mob last night. All the warehouses with large quantities of merchandise as well as four of five Russian steamers, were burned.

Probably 300 rioters were killed. Several steamships were also slain.

The troops are rapidly restoring order. The losses are estimated at many millions of roubles. The remains of the wharves and warehouses set on fire last night are still burning today and the city is enveloped in a thick cloud of smoke.

Several explosions occurred in the port during the night and hence considerable loss took place between the troops and rioters. The dead are now being buried in the harbor.

The rioters are overflying with wounded persons and the medical aid available is quite inadequate. The shops are closed and business and life is suspended. The streets are occupied by troops.

Many residents are leaving Odessa. The body of Omelchuk, the sailor executed on board the Russian battleship Knaiz Potemkin, is still exposed on the quay, where it was found by the crew of the Knaiz Potemkin yesterday. The dead man's comrades, who demand that the remains shall be accorded military honors, recently fought on the side of the rioters against the troops.

ONE LIFE LOST.

Two Firemen Hurt in a South
Brooklyn Fire.

New York, June 29.—One life has been lost and two firemen received serious burns in a South Brooklyn fire. The property loss was only \$500. William Garwood, 45, was killed while trying to reach the street to obtain aid for his wife and a servant girl. The firemen were on a hose cart, when they drove into an elevated railroad pillar to escape running down three women directly in its path.

It was expected the channel would be completed in two years, but recently the work dragged, and it is said a comparatively small balance remains of the appropriation. 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A LYNCHING BEE DOWN IN GEORGIA

Seven Negroes and One White Man
Taken From Jail and
Shot.

A VERY MIRACULOUS ESCAPE

At Command to Fire All but One
Fell Dead, But He Feigned
Death.

HE SOUGHT THE APPOINTMENT.

It Is Feared That He Has Not Acted
Fairly Toward the Govern-
ment.

Walden, N. Y., June 29.—The resignation of Chief Engineer Wallace of the Ishamian canal commission, has been accepted. The resignation was tendered at a conference in New York between Mr. Wallace and Secy. Taft. Mr. Wallace received while in Panama an offer of a position with a great corporation, the name of which is withheld, at a salary of \$60,000 per annum. His salary with the Panama canal commission and as chief engineer of the canal was \$25,000 a year. When he told Secy. Taft that he desired to accept the offer which had been tendered to him the resignation was given. Wallace's feeling in the matter, but he would remain with the commission two months longer, but after considering the matter President Roosevelt instructed Secy. Taft to accept the resignation at once. There is no general opinion as to the propriety of his resignation. It is felt that he has not acted fairly to the government, but he has not been definitely decided by Mr. Wallace's successor will be, although an announcement of his appointment may be expected within a day or two. The president and Secy. Taft have made a tender of the place to a distinguished engineering engineer, but his name is present is withheld.

Four of the prisoners were charged with being implicated in the murder of Holbrook and his wife several weeks ago, and one was held for attempting criminal assault. The others were in jail on minor charges. The mob formed just after midnight and marched to the jail where the keys were demanded. The door was opened and the mob entered the jail and the jailer realized that resistance was useless. With the keys in their possession the mob entered the cells, ordered the inmates out and then lined up in single file, tying them with ropes.

The prisoners, eight in number, were marched to a corner lot within 20 yards of the jail and in the heart of the town where they were bound to a fence with their hands tied behind them. The work had been so quickly done that the sheriff and his posse had not been alerted.

A later report says that 15 persons were injured. The injured were taken to Alliance, Ohio. When the accident occurred the prisoners were in a temporary camp while the regular jail was being repaired.

Believing his work had been made complete, the mob quickly dispersed. An examination by the jailer who had been forced by the mob to accompany it to the scene of the execution showed that seven of the men had been killed by bullets. The eighth was found to have been only slightly injured. Patterson's escape from death was as by a miracle, for the fence post to which he had been bound was torn into fragments by the bullets. He possessed the presence of mind to fall with his ill-fated companions and remained motionless on the ground.

The ratle of the volley aroused the town. Scores of citizens sprang from their beds in alarm, to find the mob nowhere in evidence, however.

The strength of the mob had been variously estimated. The jailer said that there were many armed men, all wearing masks. He says he delivered the keys to the men believing it was better to do so than what he felt he was told would mean the dynamiting of the prison. Gaining admittance to the jail, the mob first sought Sandy Price, who was arrested late yesterday afternoon by a posse. At the time of his arrest a lynching was narrowly averted. Price was charged by Mrs. Weiden Dooly, who lives in the suburbs of Walden, with having attempted to kidnap her son, Wednesday afternoon. No further trouble is anticipated.
