### Records of Men Said to be Implicated in Explosion.

Cripple Creek, Colo., Sept. 8 .- The men whom Romanie implicates with himself in the explosions in the Inde-pendence depot and Vindicator mine explosions in this district, by which it non-union miners were killed outright and others injured, are former offiers and members of miners' unions in this district.

Foster, who Romaine mentions, is believed to be Thomas Foster, a miner who lived in Independence and who was arrested by the military early in the industrial troubles in the district. He was finally released on habeas corpus proceedings, only to be rearrested and nearcerated in the county jall, charged with conspiracy to wreck the Florence & Cripple Creek suburban train on Nov 17. He was acquitted of this crime and a believed to have left here about the time of the Independence explosion. His present whereabouts are unknown, McKinley, another man mentioned by Romaine, is believed to be Charles H. McKinley, who turned state's evidence regarding the conspiracy to wreck the Florence& Cripple Creek train, Dist. Atty, Henry Trowbridge two months ago nolled the case against McKinley. He was in the district at the time of the Independence explosion and Victor rlot, but is now believed to be in a small town in Ne-

braska, where his people live. Davis, another man named by Romanie, is believed to be E. F. Davis, He was president of Miners' union No. 19 and was a member of the executive committee which called the strike in this district Aug. 10, 1903. Davis stood trial for the Vindicator murder and was equitted. He was arrested innumerable times on different charges, generally without any evidence, and was released twice by habeas corpus pro-ceedings. He has been away from the Cripple Creek district since early June Kennison is undoubtedly Charles G Kennison, former president of Miners union No. 40. Cripple Creek, and a member of the executive committee a the time of the strike. Kennison now in the county jail, having been ar-rested several weeks ago in Denver. Kennison originally came from Cocur d'Alenes and has been one of the most ardent union men in the dis trict. He was arrested by the militia and confined in the bull pen for weeks. gaining his liberty by habeas corpus proceedings.

James Hicks and Carl Nelson, other men mentioned in Romaine's confes-sion, were union miners, concerning whom little is known.

None of the men mentioned by Romaine is now in Cripple Creek district, excepting Kennison, who will stand trial in November for murder and con. I take no substitue,
