MARITAL FETERS SEVERED IN COURT

Galling Bonds are Cast Off for Three Unhappy Wives.

LEWIS MUST PAY ALIMONY.

Man With Hay Crop and No Money

Ordered to Provide for His Spouse.

Judge Morse held court for 20 minutes yesterday afternoon, but that was long enough for three miserable couples to have the galling bonds of matrimony severed and legal permission for surcease of trouble. The most aggravated case heard during the brief matinee was that of Johanna Mottler, wife of Charles E. Mottler. They were married at Racine, Wis., Aug. 27, 1905, and according to Mrs. Mottler's testimony, her husband deserted her a year ago. She also testified that he had a habit of leaving her and calling her vile names, and on one occasion, she said he knocked her down stairs just after the birth of their first baby.

Mrs. Mottler's statements were corroborated by Peter Hanson, the Danish consul in Utah, and the decree of divorce was granted.

The next case considered was that of Laura E. Stewart, who married Percy A. Stewart Oct. 11, 1904. Mrs. Stewart said her husband deserted her two years ago. The husband is now at Kansas City, Mo., and she said she should be entered against him. The decree was granted.

Amelia Crandall was given a divorce from James Crandall, to whom she was married in 1902, and she has not heard from him since, according to her statement made in court.

David E. Lewis was brought into court to show cause why he should not pay his wife, Mary J. Lewis, temporary alimony pending the trial of the divorce suit now pending in court. Lewis said he had no money, but it was shown that he had a farm on which a crop of hay is ready to be harvested, and Judge Morse ordered him to pay his wife one-third of the proceeds of his hay crop.
