EARS ON THEIR LEGS. That Is Where Those of the Ant Grow

And He Has Six of Them. Strange as it may seem, an ant has it least six cars. Aside from their multiplicity they are located in just

about the queerest place imaginableon the legs. They seem deaf to all sounds made by the vibration of the air, but detect the alightest possible ibration of solid material. This is supposed to be to their ad-

antage, in that such things as ap-

vacuage, in that such things as ap-proaching footsteps tell more of the possibility of danger than such sounds as are transmitted through the air. So sensitive are their feet, says St. Nicholas, that they detect the impact of a small birdshot dropped on the table from a height of about six inches and about 14 feet distant from an arti-ficial nest placed at the other end of the table. the table.

As curious as are their ears, their noses are ever more extraordinary. As the ants spend most of their time in the dark, they must depend largely on scent for their guidance, and in consequence have quite an elaborate ar-ray of noses each for a special nurpose. Miss Adele Fielde believes that their antennae are composed of a number of noses strung along in a line. Still more strange is that fact that each of these noses can smell only a special thing. hing.

The nose on the tip or first joint of the antenna, it is said, is for recogniz-ing the ordor of the home: the one on the second joint is to recognize re-latives. The third nose is the path-finder, and without if the poor ant can-not follow a trail and soon gets hope-lessly lost. The noses on the fourth and fifth joints are for recognizing the egg and immature ants in the next. No creature is more tidy than an ant, who cannot tolerate the presence of dirt on her body. These little creatures actually use a number of real tollet articles in keeping themselves clean. No less an authority than Dr. McCook says their tollet articles con-sist of coarse and fine-toothed combs, hair brushes, sponges and even washes and soap. Their saily is their liquid soap, and their soft tongues are their sponges.
