NO CONCESSION FOR MARCONL

Marquis of Londonderry Says it Greatest Discovery of Age.

London, March 3 .- Speaking in the house of lords today of the attitude toward wireless telegraphy, the Marquis of Londonderry, the postmaster general, said that while he, personally, re-garded the wireless system as the greatest invention of the age, he could not grant Marconi license to establish signal stations in the United Kingdom for fear of interrupting the extensive experimental work now being carried on by the admiralty, by which the gov-

ernment expected to obtain most complete results. Smallpox on the Meade.
