Layton, Davis Co., Jan. 6.—"Poor little Vase Green is dead," was the sympathetic remark that could be heard yesterday on every hand. About six weeks ago, Vase, the bright little eight-year-old daughter of John H. and Lovina Green of this place and a relative of President Joseph F. Smith, was stricken almost suddenly with renal meningitis. From the day she was taken sick till the 3rd inst., when death came to her as a relief, she suffered constantly and so severely that

her endurance was a wonder to all that were acquainted with her case. She was a lovable child and consequently a general favorite. Nothing that skill or loving kindness could do to ward off the grim reaper was left undone. Funeral was held at the family residence today at 12 m.

## BOY DISAPPEARED.

Considerable excitement was occasioned in town last evening by the sudden and somewhat mysterious disappearance of David, the fourteen-year-old son of George V. Stevenson of this place. The boy answered to roll call in school yesterday afternoon, but that was the last trace that could be had of him up to a late hour last night.

## SPANISH FORK.

A Prosperous Year.—Visitation of Smallpox—Temperance Cause Wins.

Spanish Fork, Utah Co., Jan. 5.—The last year was, in many respects, a remarkable one in regard to our city and people. Crops were excellent, much better than usual. The people received \$30,000 of cream, which is \$6,000 more than the year previous. \$12,000 for sugar beets, or about \$2,000 more than in 1898. For lucern seed in 1899 the farmers received no less than \$15,000, or nearly twice as much as the year previous. The cattle business is on an increase. It amounting to somewhere about \$12,000 for the year 1899. All goes to show that this last year was indeed a prosperous one.

A good many families have moved out of here. It being an official announcement that there are, this winter, fully sixty less children of a school age than the winter before.

## VISITATION OF SMALLPOX.

Among the unlucky happenings in this city during the year just past, is the smallpox which was brought here by the John S. Lindsay Dramatic troupe, which, besides all the annoyances and personal damages, will cost the taxpayers a considerable sum.

## TEMPERANCE CAUSE WINS.

There is still another occurrence which made the year 1899 a remarkable one in the history of our city, and that is the result of the last city election, when the voters of Spanish Fork, with the overwhelming majority of two to one, placed the seal of disapproval on the practices and policy of the party which has been in power for a number of years, and favored the saloons. High license for saloons has been the hobby here for several years, the financial benefit of high license was continually upheld and to mention the vicious and demoralizing effects of the saloons was regarded almost as treason.

The Spanish Fork city treasury is about empty, the licensed saloon hobby to the contrary notwithstanding.

At present the temperance sentiment is so strong that almost every one appears to be willing to lend all aid he can towards staying the sale of intoxicants, and thus bring on a much needed reform.

## VICTOR, IDAHO.

Further Particulars of the Death of Young Sinclair.—Other News.

## SPECIAL CORRESPONDENCE.

Victor, Bingham Co., Idaho, Dec. 31.—Our otherwise quiet hamlet was thrown into profound sorrow and excitement on Christmas day over a shocking homicide that occurred here on that day, in which Frederick C. Sinclair, brother of our respected Mayor, lost his life.

One William Baum, a worthless transient saloon keeper, his slayer, now languishes in the Blackfoot jail, with the charge of murder hanging over his head.

From the evidence presented at the coroner's inquest, conducted by Justice of the Peace N. H. Stevens, acting coroner. It appears that Sinclair went into the Baum's saloon on Christmas day, and entered into a game of cards with some others, after a while a dispute arose over the game, Baum, in his frenzy and viciousness, struck Sinclair over the head with a full beer bottle, from which he never regained consciousness, and died some forty hours afterwards. While it is a fact that Sinclair became somewhat noisy from the effects of liquor while in the saloon, Baum had no provocation at all, (so several reputable witnesses testified) to strike him such a murderous blow.

## SCHOOL CASH AVAILABLE.

Sum of \$250,245.87, to be Distributed to Various Counties of the State.

## On a basis of \$2.96 Per Capita, Salt Lake Will Get \$21,637.60.—Full List of Counties.

The State auditor has certified to the superintendent of public instruction that \$250,245.87, from the tax collections, was in the hands of the treasurer available for apportionment to the various cities and counties throughout the State, on a basis of school population.

The superintendent of public instruction will make the apportionment one day this week.

There are \$4,419 children of school age in the State, and the distribution will be at the rate of \$2.96 per capita. Salt Lake County has the school population of 7,319 and on a basis of \$2.96 per head, will receive the sum of \$21,637.60.

## GEO. DIXON VS. TERRY MCGOVERN.

Will Fight Tomorrow Night for Featherweight Championship.

BETTING AGAINST DIXON.

Champion Says I Guess I'll Be There at the Finish—He is Thoroughly Confident of Victory.

A dispatch from New York today says: George Dixon will defend his title to the featherweight championship against Terry McGovern in the ring of the Broadway Athletic club tomorrow night. Dixon has been in the ring for twelve years, first striving for and then defending the featherweight championship, always fighting clean and fair and doing his very best. He has put down champions of England and Australia as fast as they were sent against him, and battles are numbered by hundreds. In all these years he has been knocked down only once, and he has nearly always defeated his man. But in spite of his great reputation the betting is strongly against Dixon, the odds being ten to six. Not for ten years has he failed to be the favorite in any match, but now wagers are laid at even money that Dixon will be knocked out before the close of the tenth round. Dixon does not fear a knockout now. The betting does not frighten him. He is as confident of defeating McGovern as he ever was of defeating any man he ever faced. But all that can be dragged out of him about the fight is: "I don't know, I guess I'll be there at the finish. I've got nothing to do but fight and I'll do my best."

More than this the colored boy cannot be induced to say. But his actions show the importance he attaches to the fight. For this fight he has trained more carefully than for any fight he has engaged in since he went to New Orleans to meet and beat Jack Skelly in 1892. Always a willing worker, he went about the task of training for this contest with the eagerness and light-heartedness of a school boy starting off on a vacation.

Beginning with a season at West Baden Springs, he went from there to Lakewood, and in Lakewood he stayed until yesterday, when he came to this city and put up at the Delavan hotel. In the Delavan he will remain until tomorrow afternoon when he will go to Broadway club to weigh in.

McGovern makes no secret of his confidence in himself. His admirers are supporting their assertions about his prowess with money.

Tom O'Rourke and probably "Kid" McCoy, will second Dixon, while Sam Harris and Charlie White will look after McGovern.

## TOD SLOAN COMING WEST.

He Has Engaged Another Season With Lord William Beresford.

Sloan has engaged for another season with Lord William Beresford, with outside privileges. He will return to London in February.

## MAY QUIN O'Rourke.

Tom Sharkey is Dissatisfied With His Manager.

A Chicago dispatch of Jan. 7th says: Tom Sharkey, the pugilist, who arrived tonight from San Francisco, said: "I really don't know just what I will do about O'Rourke managing me in the future. Tom has not got anything over me. I always did the work and he collected his share. If Jeffries objects to my fighting with him, I will break away from him, you can rest assured I will break. Of one thing I am sure, and that is if I decide to split with O'Rourke I will in the future look after my own business."

## JOHN LAWSON DEFEATED.

Goes Down Before Orlando in a Match Race.

A dispatch from Los Angeles, Cal., says that Orlando Stevens defeated Lawson in a match race, which drew before 4,000 spectators. It was a mile heat race, two out of three motor paced. Large Increase in Nominations for the Year 1902.

A New York dispatch says: The nominations for the stakes of the Coney Island Jockey club are larger in number this year than ever before. The increase in nominations for the Futurity for 1902 is marked, there being nearly 200 more received to date than in any previous Futurity. The number of nominations follows:

Suburban, 67; June handicaps, 87; Advance, 65; Swift, 65; Spendthrift, 62; Great Trial, 127; Double Event, 124; Autumn, 136; Flight (first closing), 22; September (first closing), 29; Flatbush (first closing), 39; Great Eastern (first closing), 40; the Futurity for 1902, 1,226. Second and last closing on July 18 for the "Flight" September, Flatbush and Great Eastern.

## IS IN NO HURRY.

London, Jan. 7.—Sir Thomas Lipton, it is understood, will defer action regarding another challenge for the America's Cup until the Distant Shore and another yacht in the course of construction according to designs by C. D. Rhodes.

Experts say the Distant Shore will be an improvement upon the Britannia and the Meteor, and that the designs are much like those of the Herreshoff masterpieces. It is noted as curious that Messrs. Herreshoff and Watson should not have known they have been working on similar lines.

The Distant Shore water line will be two feet shorter than the Britannia's, but her sail area will be larger.
