SPANISH FORK.

A Prosperous Year -- Visitation of Smallpox-Temperance Cause Wins.

Special Correspondence. Spanish Fork, Utah Co., Jan. 5 .- The last year was, in many respects, a remarkable one in regard to our city and people. Crops were excellent, much better than usual. The people received \$30,000 for cream, which is \$6,000 more than the year previous; \$15,000 for sugar beets, or about \$2,000 more than in 1898. For lucern seed in 1899 the farmers received no less than \$15,000, or nearly twice as much as the year previous. The postoffice business is on an increase, it amounting to somewhere about \$12,000 for the year 1899. All goes

to show that this last year was indeed a prosperous one. A good many families have moved out of here, it being an official announcement that there are, this winter, fully sixty less children of a school age than the winter before.

Among the unlucky happenings in this city during the year just past, is the smallpox which was brought here by the John S. Lindsay Dramatic troupe, which, besides all the annoyances and personal damages, will cost the taxpayers a considerable sum. TEMPERANCE CAUSE WINS.

On a basis of 82.96 Per Capita, Salt Lake Will Get \$21,637.60 -Full List of Counties.

The State auditor has certified to the superintendent of public instruction that \$250,245.87, from the tax collections, was in the hands of the treasurer available for apportionment to the various cities and counties throughout the State, on a basis of school population.

The superintendent of public insruction will make the apportionment one day this week. There are \$4,419 children of school

age in the State, and the distribution will be at the rate of \$2,96 per capita. Salt Lake County has a school popula-tion of 7,310 and on a basis of \$2.96 per head, will receive the sum of \$21,637.60. The full list follows:
