



When this respect has been paid to half a dezen prominent candidates, Blaine will be nominated by acclamation. The World claims to have authoritative information on which to base the story of this scheme.

AMERICAN SOCIALISTS. CHICAGO, May 21.—The leaders of the American Socialists tenight hold a meeting to determine whether a Socialistic presidential ticket shall be put in the field. There is great diseatisfaction with both the Union and United Labor tickets nominated at Cincinnati. It is believed a straight out socialistic ticket will give better satisfaction to the labor element than the other two combined. John Swinton, of New York, and Captain Black, who defended the anarchists, are mentioned as the heads of the tickets. The convention, if called, will be held in July.

New Windsor, May 21.—A very largely attended spontaneous and hon-political reception was tendered Sunday evening to Hon. John A. Streator, the presidential candidate of the union labor party on his return from Cincinnati. Men of every political creed were present all giving utterance to the most cordial congratulations and heartlest good will. The address was made by Dr. Emerson on behalf of the citizens, to which Mr. Streator responded in part as follows:

"This spontaneous demonstration in honor of one of your citizens being nominated to the high office of President was wholly unexpected by me and I hardly know what to say. I thank you kindly my friends, for this distinguished and cordial reception. I did not desire the nomination but when it came to me from every section of the country I thought it was the voice of the industrial people. In the past, Presidential candidates have been chosen from two classes of our people—lawyer and soldier—while the great industrial classes comprising three-fourths of the people have had no candidate. Is it a wonder then that their interest have been neglected? I deem it unwise to discuss political issues and as you have done I too will throw down political questions."

Several toasts were responded to by leading citizens after which the assemblage dispersed.

Preparations at Chicago. CHICAGO, May 21.-The sub-commitof the national republican comdays, arranging the details of the con-vention and deciding upon the dis-tribution of tickets and the allotment of seats to the press and other matters of detail. No other papers excepting those sending out such reports can be given representation of these tables. In the 147 seats are included the seats required by the Associated Press and the official stenographers. The local press committee was directed to carry out these provisions, and were also notified that the largest number of working seats to be given to any paper should be three. The greater portion of the daily papers taking reports will have but one seet. Afternates will have notickets but their own. It has been the usual custom to give to the city where the convention is held to per cent, of the tholets. The committee has reduced that to 10 per cent. The remaining tickets will be divided among the press, between members of Congress, governors of states, and other distinguished statesmen.

CHICAGO, Ill., May 21.—The thirteenth annual convention of the Nord Amerikanischer Turner Bund beganhere Sumday. Delegates to the number of 571 are present from all parts of the country. Dr. H. M. Starkloffe, of St. Louis, the president, called the assembly to order and made the opening address. He said that a number of important and delicate questions would be brought before the body for its consideration and that only its greatest calmness and deliberation should be involved in dealing with them. In referring to certain charges made he said that the Turn Bund has nothing in common with the doctrines of anarchism. The events of the last few years had intruded themselves within the precincts of this organization and he trusted they would be disposed of in a business-like, just and harmonious manner. The tenor of the antire speech was to the end that the Turn Bund was far from being anarchistic or even socialistic in its tendency.


