LOCAL BRIEFS.

A. J. Cannon Returns—President A. J. Cannon has returned from spending the winter at St. George.

To Aid Orphans—Mrs. W. W. Cliff of 291 Douglas avenue, has offered to adopt one of the Puerre children and will try to find homes for the others.

First South Apartments—George S. Swallow of Nevada has bought 77 feet of 2nd east First South street from Edward Home, where he proposes to erect an apartment house.

Painters Aged Nine Years—The local painters' union will celebrate the ninth anniversary of its organization next Friday evening, with an entertainment in Federation hall.

To Erect Big Mill—Manager M. H. Green of the San Vincente Lumber company, has gone to Santa Cruz, Cal., to superintend the building of a large sawmill there for his company, to cost \$150,000.

Arthur Coon Resigns—Arthur D. Coon, manager of the contract department of the Utah Independent Telephone company, has resigned. Mrs. Coon and their sons will join Mr. Coon in Idaho, after spending some time on the coast.

Chance for Forest Rangers—Rangers' examinations will be held April 24 and 25 at the following places: Beaver, Ephraim, Escalante, Grantsville, Kanab, Logan, Moab, Panguitch, Payson, Provo, St. George, Salina and Salt Lake City.

Joining the Army—The local army recruiting station on West Temple street, has received recruits in 10 days—five from Salt Lake, and three from Ogden. Six of these were sent to infantry regiments, and two to the coast artillery service.

Confer on Forest Policy—Supervisor Clarke of the forest service has gone to Pleasant Grove and American Fork to confer with local cattle owners on complaints as to administration in grazing, the apportionment of the salt tax and other matters of kindred interest.

Inspect Reservoir Site—The state land board is in Salt Lake inspecting a reservoir project upon which a loan of \$10,000 is asked by a Gunnison company, of which Oscar B. Bergland is president. The project will bring under cultivation a large tract of valuable land. The question of making the loan will be decided at the adjournment session of the board, to be held April 17.

POSTAL IN NEVADA.

General Manager E. J. McNally of the Postal Telegraph company has just made arrangements at Goldfield, Nev., for entry of his company into Nevada. It is to work in conjunction with the Southern Nevada Telephone and Telegraph company, composed of a majority of Nevadans, at least 200 leading men of the state, prominently associated with its progress and development, being included among the stockholders. It is planned to keep the control of the new electric system of communication in Nevada, if possible. The line will run through the entire state and will stretch from Reno to Salt Lake, and through southern Nevada to the point jutting on Arizona. The more important of the smaller running camps will be included in the system.

NEW POSTAL ORDER.

Orders have been issued by Postmaster-General Meyer which forbid employees in the mail service holding any other offices, paying salaries. Members upon school boards, religious and library boards and positions of the nature, paying no salaries, are permitted but political offices are tabooed.

SNOWFALL FOR MARCH.

The snowfall for the month of March was generally about average. The estimated depth of snow in the mountainous districts at the close of the month ranges from one to eight feet, which is considerably less than last year, and it is below the average amount. The snow is generally well packed and drifted in the canyons and gulches in the high altitudes. The storm at the end of the month added considerably to the supply of snow in the mountains over the state. The prospective water supply for the coming season appears to be very good with some exceptions. The rivers and streams are well supplied with water.

High School Boys Plan Trip to Coast for Fleet Celebration.

SHOT STOPS KIDNAPING

Daring Plot to Rob Stranger Cut Short With Bartender's Revolver.

Two daring robbers made a bold attempt Saturday night to kidnap and rob Victor Bain at Kennedy's saloon, 327 South State street, and might have succeeded had it not been for Kennedy who came to Bain's rescue and frightened the robbers away with a revolver. The men tried to get Bain into a hack, drive him to a lonely place on the city drive and kidnap him.

BROUGHT A CARRIAGE.

The man soon returned with a carriage which was driven into the alleyway, and tried to get Bain into the vehicle. Bain resisted and Kennedy became suspicious. On the box of the hack with the driver was a confederate of the short man. He also tried to force Bain into the hack. Bain continued to resist and called for help, saying: "These men are not my friends." At this stage of the game Kennedy drew a revolver and started toward the robbers. The short man became frightened and ran. Kennedy fired a shot at him. The man on the hack struck the horses with the whip and the vehicle drove out of the alley. The police were notified but could find no trace of the men. They arrested the hack driver, "Red" Rowe, but he convinced the officers that he knew nothing of the matter. The latter is a stranger in the city.

WILL FILE ANSWER

Water Rights Will Not Go By Default—Meeting to be Held Wednesday.

Owners of water rights in Parley's canyon have perfected plans through which they will hold their rights against a possibility of default in the city law suit to quiet title. On Wednesday evening another meeting will be held in Sugar ward for the purpose of considering the filing of an answer to the city's suit for title to a large portion of the stream.

Increased in population that they would install water mains if the flow of Parley's stream could be regained. At the time the documents were drawn up a winning argument was that the warmer Utah lake water would be better for their crops than the cold mountain stream.

CITY PERMITS DELAY.

While it is now more than 20 days since most of the defendants in the present suit were served with summonses, the city attorney has agreed to wait for a general answer. Ogden Hiles, formerly city attorney, brought the suit to annul the farmer's title to part of the stream, or rather to quiet city title secured through the purchase of ranches which used water without objection from those lower down, as all of it eventually found its way back into the creek. With Mr. Hiles was associated F. S. Richards, who served during the Morris city administration as a special authority upon water and irrigation rights in Salt Lake valley. As many Salt Lake attorneys live within the district affected by the city's suit they are willing to serve in the case. Among them are Daniel Harrison, Atty.-Gen. M. A. Bredder, who appears for the state prison interests, Can. Cott, Allison & Ritter; Hurd & Hurd; J. H. Moyle, Goodwin and Van Pelt; Ray and Cole; Samuel Russell, and a number of others. It is probable that before the case comes to trial an agreement will be reached on counsel for the entire number of defendants who total 2,000 people.
