EDITORIAL NOTES.

The population of Australia at the last census was 1,742,200. The population of its capital, Melbourne, is 210,000.

According to *Le Monde Russ*, the following captures have been made by Russia during the present war with Turkey: 704 cannon, 29 Pashas and 73,128 officers and men.

The next astronomical hour of more than ordinary interest will be the transit of Mercury, which will take place on the 6th of next May. The French Government has made arrangements for a scientific observation of the transit, and will send an expedition to San Francisco, which will be the best point of view.

A Minneapolis doctor, named Tanner, for the purpose of showing how long a man can live without food, announces that he has fasted for six weeks. He offers to repeat the experiment under the closest surveillance for \$5,000; \$1,000 to be subject to his honor, and \$4,000 is devoted to charitable purposes as a committee shall direct. He agrees to abstain from food, totally. Mr. Tanner can do this, skeptics will have no cause for doubting the 40 days and nights' fasting recorded in Holy Scripture.

The Transcript claims that California is ahead of all the States of the Union in newspaper and periodical literature, and gives the following figures to prove it: "there are now published in San Francisco 16 dailies, 43 weeklies, 1 semi-weekly and 15 monthlies and semi-monthlies. In the State there are published 250 journals and periodicals, of which 47 are daily papers. The average circulation is 10,000. The number of copies printed each year to each inhabitant is 90, being the highest average of any State in the Union. The average for New York is 89 and for Massachusetts 75. The general average is 82."

CHRISTIAN ISRAELITES.

A CONVENTION of Israelites who are willing to accept Jesus Christ as the Messiah of the world, is called for through the New York Herald, by Rev. David Rosenberg, M. D., of Columbus, Ohio, who desires correspondence with a view to fixing the time and place for the assembly. The object of the convention is stated to be:

"First, to form an alliance of all the converted Jews and of Israel with the world and to appoint a set time to meet the sons of the nation in rejecting Jesus Christ the Son of God and crucifying him, thereby bringing the wrath of God upon the nation. Therefore God has said the nation shall be dispersed throughout the world till the time comes when it is come. God has promised first 'The Gentiles shall be converted to us' and then 'to us our sons' He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all uncleanness.' Second, to form a basis for a national existence upon the New Testament Scriptures as the statute and law of the nation. Third, to implore the nation to yield to the God of Palestine to the people of God for this is the day of grace. The conflict in the East indicates that the day of the Lord is at hand."

We hope the call will not die out without effect.
