Take 100,000 persons alive at the age of 10 years, when most of the diseases of childhood have been successfully gone through with and the heavy mortality incident to infancy is past. Out of this 100,000, 14,559 will die in the years of early youth and the beginning of ma-turity-that is to say. In the 20 years from age 10 to age 30. At the latter age, 85,441 persons will be still living, according to the estimates. In the according to the estimates. In the next 20 years a much higher propor-tion of persons will die, and at 50 years old 69,903 will be yet alive. This shows that 20 per cent or 30,000 of the 100,000 will never live to see their fiftiath birth-day. This is particularly sterificant win hever live to see their infight birth-day. This is particularly significant when we consider that a man's best work is in most cases accomplished between the ages of 30 and 50. Going still further, 5,240 will die out of the remaining 69,000 between the ages of 45 and 50 years, At 50 years the man who has not accumulated his compe-tency has not accumulated his competency has nothing left to live for but a bare existence. Even if he has suf-ficient income at that time to want ficient income at that time to want insurance, he has not only practically outlived the necessity for it as his family is by that time able to take care of themselves, but he is in fact a "dead one" as far as a policy is con-cerned, for he has only one chance in a hundred of being able to pass the phys-ical examination. Some companies draw the dead line at 60 years, others as 65. As a side-light on this question it should be remembered that the last national census shows 32 per cent of the widows in the United States earn their own living.

Given Out Because of Attacks on Aldrich Currency Bill by Senator La Follette.

PRESIDENT APPROVED IT.

Otherwise Would Not Have Signed It -Avowedly an Emergency Measure, Yet it is Good.

Lincoln, Aug. 21.-Because of the attacks made upon the Aldrich currency bill by Senator La Follette, together with his demanding of roll calls on that bill, Senator E. J. Burkett today gave out two letters from President Roosevelt commending the Aldrich law unqualifiedly. Senator Burkett received the following letter from the president: Oyster Bay, N. Y., Aug. 18, 1908.

My Dear Sir-1 heartily approve of the currency measure, otherwise I would not have signed the bill. In my judgment it would have been most un-wise not to have passed it, and not a single argument worth heeding was advanced against it. I enclose you a copy of a letter I had already written on the subject. Sincerely yours, THEODORE ROOSEVELT.

Following is the copy of the letter referred to by the president:

referred to by the president: Oyster Bay, N. Y., July 23, 1908. My Dear Willis-I have your letter of the 20th. My motives were simply those I have in signing any good bill. Beyond all question, the emergency currency bill was a good measure, and I have not heard it attacked with any arguments which I thought even deserved an an-swer. It is avowedly only an emerg-ency measure; it lasts merely the length of time to permit us to develop a permanent plan; but during that time, it makes provision for the needed elasticity of currency, and it does it in an utterly unobjectionable manner. It does not accomplish very much, but it
