CIVIL SERVICE.

Civil service examinations are announced to occur at Logan and Salt Lake City in the near future, for eligibles from which to fill various positions in the government service. For Dec. 9 is announced examinations for an assistant inspector of incandescent lamps in the quartermaster's department at large, Washington, D. C., at a salary of \$840 per annum; inspector of musical instruments in the quartermaster's department at large at Philadelphia, Pa., salary \$600 per annum; inspector of clothing, for quartermaster's department at Jeffersonville, Ind., salary \$900 per annum; computer, male, for United States naval observatory at Washington, D. C., salary from \$1,000 to \$1,200 per annum; assistant (male), in naval observatory, salary \$1,000 per annum; two days will be required for the examinations on the two last named subjects. On Dec. 15, an examination will be held for laboratory assistant qualified in chemistry, salary \$1,000

per annum, assistant physicist qualified in mechanical engineering, \$1,600 per annum.

An examination will be held on Dec. 21 for copper plate map engraver, \$900 per annum, and eligibles in this line having been so hard to secure, those qualified are urged to apply. The examination is general and candidates are not required to appear at any particular place. Information may be had regarding all examinations from the commission at Washington, or at the Salt Lake or Logan postoffices.
