## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Called to Butte**—Dr. H. D. Niles was called to Butte last night, to attend the wife of Dr. Murray of that city. She has friends in this city.

**Stock Taking**—Z. C. M. I. will be closed in all departments on Wednesday, Jan. 2, for stock taking. The funds of the big institution will also be down on New Year's, as a holiday.

**Officers Meeting**—There was a meeting yesterday of the officers of the three associations occupying the Chamber of Commerce, when it was decided to formally open the chamber-boys' meeting, Jan. 14-16.

**Boys' Meeting**—will be held in the boys' section at 3:30 p. m. Sunday, Mr. R. D. Burton will be the speaker. Good singing and special music by the orchestra has been provided. All boys whether members or not over 11 years of age, are invited.

**Died at Infirmary**—W. C. Henderson, aged 45, died yesterday, at the County Infirmary. The deceased was a native of New York, and a member of the United Association of Hotel and Restaurant Employees. J. W. Taylor has charge of the remains.

**Settlement Made**—President Lovoy of the State Beekeepers' association, has concluded arrangements with the beekeepers who have been settled on a basis of about \$1,500 damages from each company to be divided among the bee men of the valley.

**Men's Meeting**—The festive meeting for men in the Y. M. C. lobby Sunday, at 5 p. m. will be conducted this week by the Rev. F. H. Gwynne, D. D., of Butte, Mont. Special singing by one of the associated quartets. A cordial invitation is extended to all men.

**Insurance Business Good**—George A. Ryder, Pacific coast manager of the Security Mutual Insurance company, is in town for a few days, and states that the insurance business on the coast has picked up wonderfully well of late. Christmas trade in Oakland and San Francisco is excellent.

**Special Program**—The Mutual Improvement Association of Sugar ward will give a special holiday program tomorrow evening beginning at 6:30 o'clock. A splendid musical program has been arranged, and in addition to this a short talk will be given by Stephen L. Richards on "The Three Wise Men."

**One Year Each**—Judge Armstrong has sentenced James Gibson and Geo. A. Kelly to one year each in the state prison for the crime of burglary in the first degree. The men pleaded guilty to the charge of burglarizing the store of Frank Hoffman at Murray on the night of Nov. 29. They were caught in the act by the night policeman at Murray.

**The Medal Awarded**—A large audience attended the novel oratorical contest last evening, in the Phillips Congregational church, which was won by Mrs. Charles Chandler, the prize being a tin medal being contested for by six speakers. The medal was in the shape of a shield, and was manufactured to order. The high of the evening, was the Street Music quartet who appeared dressed in large white sheets, with comb and paper orchestral accompaniment. Lunch was afterwards served.

**Lost Cash or Draft**—One Peter Olson, late of Idaho, complained to the police last yesterday that he had been robbed of a draft for \$200. He claims that the paper was taken from him by a colored woman at the Union bar, 64 Commercial street, Christmas night. As the draft was on an Ogden bank, Olson has been engaged to stop it. In the meantime it was presented for payment at the National Bank of the Republic by S. W. Sears and was paid. Yesterday Sears was called upon to explain his part of the transaction, and said that he cashed the draft at the instance of Olson, the latter subsequently receiving the money. He claims that if Olson was not a man of cash and not of the draft, Sears was released upon his own recognition, pending a further investigation of the matter.

## HUSBAND GOT ALIMONY.

Therefore a Divorced Man Did Not Feel Like Paying.

James C. Arnold was cited into Judge Morse's court yesterday afternoon to show cause why he should not be punished for contempt for failing to pay his divorced wife, Emma Arnold Matthews alimony for the support of her children, made the charge in court that his wife's present husband got the benefit of the money which he paid for alimony and he asked that he be relieved from further payments. Mrs. Matthews and her husband both testified that every cent of the money paid by Arnold had been used for the benefit of the children. Judge Morse reduced the amount of the alimony from \$20 to \$10 per month for the present.

In the case of Elizabeth Thomas against Benjamin F. Thomas, the defendant was ordered by Judge Morse to pay his wife \$20 per month as temporary maintenance and her husband in his cross-complaint asks for divorce.

Four decrees of divorce were granted in favor of plaintiffs during the regular weekly divorce call in Judge Morse's court yesterday afternoon. Carrie Hummel was divorced from Robert Hummel on the grounds of desertion and failure to support. Plaintiff was awarded the custody of her child and \$25 per month alimony. Angela Mazuch was granted a divorce from Joe Mazuch on the grounds of cruelty and failure to support. She was given the custody of their seven children and was awarded \$20 per month alimony and \$50 as attorney's fees.

A decree of divorce was granted to Marie Y. Pickett from Albert J. Pickett on the ground of failure to support. Plaintiff's money claim was granted. Marie Y. Uhlig was restored to her.

Anna Shulsen was granted a divorce from John Shulsen on the ground of failure to support. Plaintiff was awarded the custody of their two children and \$20 per month alimony.
