**The Bachmangel Case.**—This interesting case was brought up last Saturday in the Commission court of Ogden, before J. H. Nelson, Esq. After arguments on both sides it was decided that the complaint was not sufficient to proceed against the defendant. The prosecution asked that the prisoner be held until to-day to allow time to file a new complaint, as defendant was about to leave Utah. The Court declined authority to hold the prisoner. The prosecution then asked the Court to hold the case under advisement until a new complaint could be filed, that the ends of justice might not be frustrated. While defendant's counsel was arguing for a dismissal of the case, the prosecution and witness hastily retired to prepare another complaint, which they succeeded in filing before the court adjourned. So Bachmangel will have to remain and fight it out.

Here is a remedy that will perhaps save some poor man's horse. Give half oz. of saleratus in half a pint of lukewarm water, and if not better in half an hour, repeat the dose. If not then relieved, you had better get your veterinary, as there is something more than a simple colic at work."

CULLED FROM LATEST EXCHANGES.

—Reuben Kirkham is exhibiting his panoramas, illustrative of Book of Mormon scenes, in Sevier County.

—On the 18th, Thatcher Station, on the Utah & Northern, was closed to all business and abandoned as a station. The reason for this action is the small amount of business transacted there.

—At Hyrum, Cache County, one day last week, two little boys, N. K. Nielson and H. Jensen, were chopping wood, when the latter accidentally struck the former in the head with an axe, inflicting a gash about three inches long.

—Last Friday Mr. Hyrum Thatcher and wife, of Logan, were riding in a buggy when the horse was frightened and ran away. The occupants of the buggy succeeded in getting out unhurt just before the vehicle collided with a telegraph pole and was badly damaged.

—The D. & R. G. employees received their pay last Friday and the evening of that day some half dozen of them were the victims of attempted robberies. As the pay was in checks, however, and useless to all but their proper owners, the disappointed foot-pads had their fingers crossed.

—The watchman at the D. & R. G. depot and one of the porters were also clubbed, but the victims had no spoils for the robbers.

—Last Wednesday a serious accident occurred on the Utah & Northern near Williams Ranch, Montana. No. 9, a freight, going north, broke into three parts, on a down grade. The portion of the train next to the engine was keeping out of the way of the "wild" cars behind, when suddenly No. 10, a fourth bound freight, came in sight. The engineer of No. 9 was in a dilemma, but to avoid a collision with No. 10 he stopped his engine, when the "wild" cars behind him telescoped with those next to his engine. A bad wreck was the result, but no person was hurt. The wreck caused a delay of 18 hours to the passenger train.

**The Russians have adopted a method** of raising revenue that permits no one, native or foreigner, to escape contributing to the national expenses. In addition to the price charged by the dealer, the purchaser pays a tax which is distinctly designated upon each article of food and clothing—and in fact everything he buys. An American traveler recently in Russia stated that in the course of a few weeks the Russian Government collected thirty dollars from him on his railroad tickets alone, the rate of taxation being about twenty per cent. If Russia's railway were nationalized at anything like the rate they are in this country the national debt would soon be paid; but they are not, the number of miles of railway being only thirteen thousand, and the passenger and freight traffic being even more limited in proportion.
