LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRICAL.—"Narcissus" is a beautiful and interesting drama, being a production of the author of "The Waters Run Deep," and the title role received ample notice at the hands of Mr. Bandmann last night. This is his masterpiece and after witnessing his splendid performance of it, we are not surprised at the high reputation he has attained in the profession. His rendition of this character alone would be sufficient to give him popularity. The role is well as power, for in the character is concentrated a wonderful combination of wit, philosophy, mirthfulness, semi-madness, with a deep pathos. THE HAY QUESTION.—A gentleman of this city, under the name of plane of Z., has sent us the following timely and sensible comments upon the above question:

"One of the vexed questions of this city is in regard to the practice of our hay sellers, the general presumption is that hay is sold by the ton, an understood standard of definite weight, but in practice a ton may be twelve hundred or any intermediate quantity between the above and the legitimate one, according to the elasticity of conscience possessed by the seller. The presumed ignorance or modesty of the buyer, when men purchase calves, sugar or eggs, is by a definite measure, weight, or count. In the latter article we have heard of dealers being so very scrupulous in regard to the rights of purchasers that they would accept stock of eggs and sell it at that would pass through a given auger hole would be dealt out at a market rate, say four cents a dozen, while those which would not pass would be considered worth five cents. A little of this scrupulous anxiety for right would not injure our hay sellers, and would be a benefit to all their patrons. Public sentiment and law long since abandoned the selling of grain and potatoes by measure, and no argument can be used to sustain such a practice that is not more readily applicable to the article of hay. Our city fathers should compel the weighing of all hay sold, and refusal to do so or give weight should be considered prima facie evidence of fraud. If persons think they are unable to pay present rates for hay, let them go to the public, who should only purchase on presentation of weight ticket. All practicesavoring of dishonesty in the seller, such as weighing men or weighing hay should be punished by ordinance, during the circumstances.

This matter has been called up by late circumstances, but the evil is of long standing and while some may think that the practice has the sanction of the customer, all say it is one, more honored in the breach than in the observance, and a few of hay is just about as indefinite as the answer given in court, in reply to a question of weight by weighing, "What was the size of the stone thrown?" enquired the judge. "About the size of a piece of chalk," your honor," replied the witness.

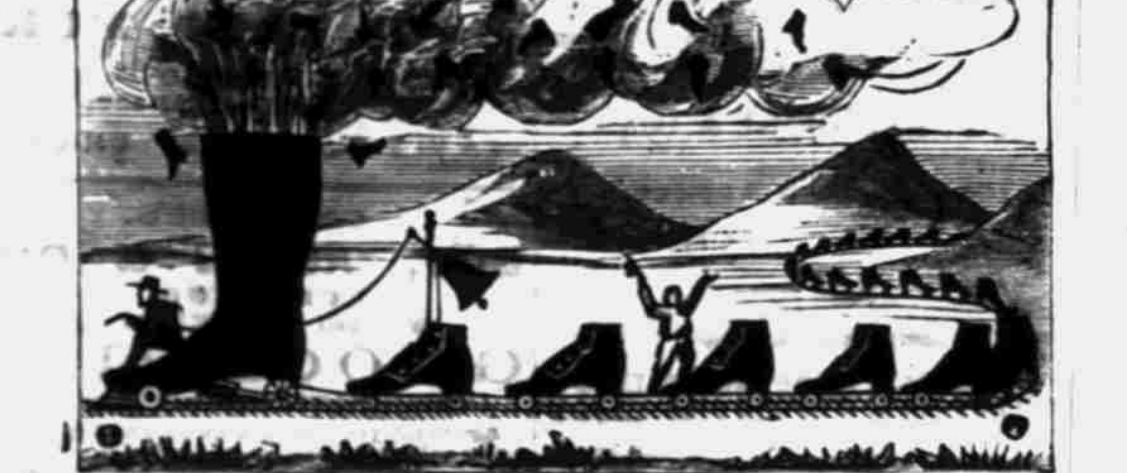
